

# Oregon News Briefs

**E-R BIDS**  
Portland—(UPI)—Hoffman Construction company of Portland was apparent low bidder Thursday at \$5,297,000 for construction of the city's long-awaited Exposition Recreation center. The price was nearly \$1 million under the lowest offer made last October. Work might start next week.

**JAPAN FLIGHT**  
Portland—(UPI)—The first Japan Air Lines flight over the great circle route is scheduled to land here next Tuesday carrying 41 company officials. The flight is in preparation for a new service between Japan and Seattle.

**PROGRESS**  
Portland—(UPI)—Two of the ramps at the east end of the new Morrison street bridge here are doomed. County Commissioners Thursday approved a Highway Department request to relocate the two eight-month-old ramps to make way for the new East Bank Freeway.

**RETIREMENT HOME**  
Portland—(UPI)—Plans were announced Thursday for a new \$1,300,000 modern retirement home at Tolovana Park near Cannon Beach on the Oregon Coast. The home would be built by King's Garden, a Protestant interdenominational organization with headquarters in Seattle.

**RUSSELL CONFIRMED**  
Salem—(UPI)—The Senate Commerce and Utilities Committee Thursday approved confirmation of Lewis S. Russell, Portland barge line operator, as a member of the Port of Portland Commission. Also approved were three other ex-Gov. Robert D. Holmes' appointments to the Portland Commission—L. H. Hoffman, Lee Caldwell and Winston Casey. The Senate may act on the recommendations Monday.

**INVITATIONS READIED**  
Salem—(UPI)—The House passed and sent to the Senate Thursday a resolution issuing a Centennial invitation to President and Mrs. Eisenhower and others. The list included Vice President and Mrs. Richard Nixon, who plan to be here Feb. 14; former presidents Herbert Hoover and Harry Truman and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt.

**LIVESTOCK BRANDS**  
Salem—(UPI)—A bill to simplify the required re-recording of livestock brands every five years was passed by the House and sent to the Senate Thursday. It also would allow a re-recording cost of under \$5, which is cost of the original recording.

**COURT SEEKS BUDGET**  
Salem—(UPI)—The State Supreme Court Thursday asked an appropriation of \$517,000 for the 1959-61 biennium. The current biennium budget was \$517,000.

**Neuberger Nears End of Treatments**  
Portland—(UPI)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Thursday he expects to complete his medical treatments "about this week end." Date of his return to Washington, D.C. is still uncertain, however. Neuberger said his physicians will release a statement "some time next week" regarding his condition. Neuberger said there is a possibility that his doctors may recommend a short rest before resuming his duties in the Senate. He has been undergoing radiation treatments in Portland since removal of a small cancer last year.

Washington—(UPI)—Senate investigators turned away from the missile controversy today to the question of where the United States stands in its space race with Russia.

The combined Senate space and preparedness committees called as their first witness Dr. T. Keith Glennan, administrator of the civilian National Aeronautics and Space Agency.

The sweeping inquiry will look next into the Defense Department's space programs. Other congressional news: GI Housing: A measure to permit an increase in the interest rate on new GI housing mortgages appeared to have a good chance of winning House approval next week.
