

## UN Activity Reviewed; Chapter Holds Election

A review of various phases of United Nations activity and progress, and election of officers marked the January meeting of the Medford chapter, Oregon United Nations association, held Thursday night at Girls Community club.

Mrs. Rex Nicodemus was named vice-president, Mrs. Eva Ringo, secretary, and Mrs. Kenneth Murray, treasurer. Election of a president to succeed Moore Hamilton was postponed at the recommendation of the nominating committee, headed by Mrs. Harlan P. Bosworth Jr.

First speaker of a group of five was Mr. Bosworth, who recently was elected to membership in the American Nuclear society in recognition for his study and knowledge of the subject. Mr. Bosworth's topic had to do with the UN and atomic research and control, and he prefaced his talk by saying that of all man's discoveries, none had made as much progress as fast as the atom. The speaker then said that atomic research holds the greatest potential for the benefit of man of anything yet discovered.

Mr. Bosworth reviewed atomic uses in the scientific, military and power field, and stressed that the possibilities for medicine, agriculture and metallurgy are considered practically unlimited. The speaker reminded his audience of President Eisenhower's proposal through the United Nations for peaceful use and control of atomic energy, of this country's sharing of knowledge and materials, and the world congresses held to share information. The world congress on atomic energy held at Geneva has been called the greatest and most important gathering ever held, he said.

The second conference dealt with thermo-nuclear problems. Mr. Bosworth said, and added that three panels have been set up to study the matter of irradiated waste disposal, legal problems, and to study the transportation of irradiated materials.

**Problem For People**

Whether the United States should deal directly with other nations in the matter of promoting atomic energy for peaceful uses, or direct all its efforts through the United Nations Atomic Energy agency is a problem for the people to decide, he concluded.

Jim Frohnmayer, president of the International Relations league at Medford high school, spoke of the role of the UN agencies which are providing technical assistance in areas throughout the world where it is needed. The young man reviewed the teams of experts sent to these countries, and spoke of the fellowship provided for training these experts.

The speaker said the United States has given strong support to this technical assistance program since 1951, that it is definitely tied to the nation's foreign policy, and strengthens the position of both the United States and the United Nations throughout the world.

He pointed out that the USSR had at first ridiculed this program, but later adopted the idea. Although the results are hard to measure, it is generally conceded to be a program which should be continued and strengthened, he said, and added that 132 countries and territories are now involved in technical as-

"Let's talk dry cleaning"

Here's a suggestion about SHRINKAGE... a complex subject that deserves more discussion in future columns. Most clothes you buy bear a manufacturer's label indicating the percentage of maximum shrinkage. To the average person it doesn't mean much to know that the garment won't shrink more than 1%... so translate this into inches.

If a dress has a waist width of, say, 25 inches and the shrinkage is 1%, that means that the shrinkage in width will be 1/4 inch or less. If it's 50 inches long, it won't shrink more than 1/2 inch in length. This minimum shrinkage means your clothes will retain good fit. If the shrinkage goes up to 2%, be sure there is no risk of the garment getting too tight (2% shrinkage on 25 inches is 1/2 inch, or 50 inches, 1 inch, etc.). Any greater listed shrinkage should make you hesitate unless the garment is unusually loose-fitting. If the manufacturer will not guarantee a garment against shrinkage under normal dry cleaning procedures, do not expect your dry cleaner to.
