Rochester, N.Y.—Carol Heiss, so supreme in figure skating that she fears only a stumble over a text book, will lead all the newly-crowned United States Senior titlists except David Jenkins into the North American championships next weekend at Toronto.

Miss Heiss, women's world champion the past three years, easily won her third straight title Sunday at War Memorial auditorium. Carol, 19, a New York university sophomore from Ozone Park, N.Y., is no braggart, but inadvertently revealed her only worry after defeating her sister, Nancy, 17.

"It was thrilling to win, but what really concerned me was my examinations," Carol said after her intricate jump spins and reverse axels in the free skating earned her the first-place votes of each of the five judges.

Jenkins, 23, a medical student from Colorado Springs, Colo., won the senior men's crown Saturday. He also received a perfect score of five ordinals, drawing a first-place vote from each of the five judges, and automatically was selected for the U.S. team which will perform at Toronto. But Jenkins was forced to decline because of his heavy pre-medical study schedule at Western Reserve.
