Allis-Chalmers Strike Talk Set

Milwaukee, Wis. -UPI- Negotiators for the Allis-Chalmers Co. and the United Auto Workers will meet with U. S. conciliators Thursday afternoon to discuss the strike by 14,000 workers against eight A-C plants.

Officials of the U. S. Conciliation Service said the firm is a union and the union were contacted Tuesday night and both agreed to the meeting immediately.

The federal service acted in the wake of company charges of mass picketing at four of the strike-bound Allis-Chalmers plants. The union denied the charge, and accused the firm of "manufacturing a case to put the UAW on the spot."



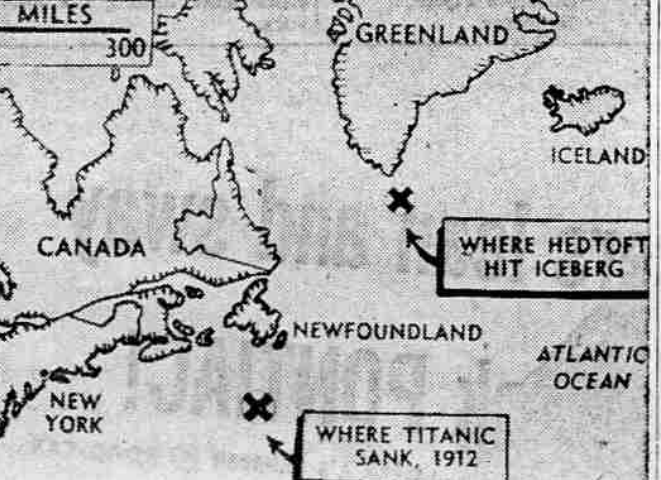

Pontifical High Mass Ends Church Observance Here

A solemn pontifical high mass Monday honoring the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, followed by a reception at St. Mary's High school for the Rev. Edward D. Howard, D.D., Archbishop of Portland in Oregon, brought to a close the official two-day Centennial celebration of the blessing of St. Joseph's Catholic church of Jacksonville.

In honor of the occasion, the Archbishop declared the remainder of the day a holiday for all St. Mary school students and teachers.

The pontifical mass was celebrated by Archbishop Howard, assisted by priests of the vicinity. The Rev. Carl Mai, pastor of Sacred Heart parish, was archpriest and delivered the occasional sermon.

Students of St. Mary's grade and high schools sang and the Gregorian proper of the mass was chanted by the Boys' choir.

After the pontifical mass, Archbishop Howard was the guest of honor at a reception given by the students of the high school and in the school activities room. Sharon Roberts delivered the welcoming address.

Monday evening Archbishop Howard was guest of honor at Our Lady of the Mountain parish building fund drive victory dinner, which he attended at Bellevue Grange with the clergy of the Southern Oregon Diocese.

The Ashland parish is now completing plans for building a new church plant.

Faubus' Use of Law Challenged

Little Rock, Ark. -UPI-The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has asked for a three-judge federal court to determine if the law used by Gov. Orval Faubus to close Little Rock's high schools to prevent integration is constitutional.

U. S. District Judge John E. Miller denied a request by the Little Rock school board Tuesday to re-open the schools as segregated institutions.

The board asked permission to re-open the schools, segregated, immediately, and then be granted until next Aug. 15 to come up with a new plan for integration to replace the one which led to rioting at Central High school on Sept. 23, 1957.

In denying that request, Miller accepted a report from the board which said it could do nothing in the face of four state laws passed by a special legislative session last August.

It was those statute which Gov. Faubus used to close the schools.

Wiley A. Branton, chief legal counsel for the NAACP in Arkansas, then asked for the review of the law used by Faubus by the federal judiciary body.

ACCEPTS INVITATION

Dublin, Ireland -UPI-President Sean T. O'Kelly of Ireland has accepted the invitation of President Eisenhower to visit Washington on St. Patrick's Day, March 17, it was announced Tuesday. It will be the first state visit by a president of the Irish republic to the United States. O'Kelly will spend 10 days as the guest of Eisenhower before going on a tour of the states.
