Harris Ellsworth Plans To Relax in Home at Roseburg

Washington - (UPI) - Harris Ellsworth, retiring chairman of the Civil Service Commission, said today he's "through with politics" and plans to return to Oregon and "do my best to semi-retire."
 The 59-year-old former Republican congressman said he has "no definite plans" and hopes to spend most of his time "playing a little golf and doing some trout fishing."
 Ellsworth, who served in the House of Representatives from 1942 to 1956 and has been Civil Service chairman for the past two years, told United Press International that "after all these busy years in Washington, I want to try just doing nothing for awhile."
 The former legislator said Feb. 27 will be his last day on the job at the Commission. He said he and his wife will leave Washington by car the next day, stopping at Santa Fe, N.M., to visit their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas F. McKenna, en route. They also expect to see friends in Southern California. They expect to arrive at their home in Roseburg, Ore., around March 20.

Two Arrested for Gold Act Violation

Washington - (UPI) - Secret Service headquarters announced today agents arrested two men in Salt Lake City Thursday night on charges of illegally acquiring and holding gold in violation of the U. S. Gold Reserve Act.
 Agents also seized an estimated \$2,100 worth of semi-processed gold ore from a Salt Lake City assayer, who was not arrested.
 A Secret Service spokesman identified the two men, scheduled to be arraigned in federal court in Salt Lake City today, as James Maughan, 37, and Thomas M. Montgomery, 29. The spokesman said Maughan is employed by Pioneer Realty Co., and Montgomery by Kennecott Copper Co.

Voice May Warn Reds of Storms

Washington (Science Service) - By listening to the sea's voice, Russian scientists say they may be able to detect approaching storms.
 A Scientific Information Report circulated here by the Central Intelligence Agency carries an abstract from an "unevaluated" paper prepared by Ya. Petrov, a Russian scientist. Petrov said Soviet Academician V. V. Shuleykin has studied the vortex air flow behind sea waves which creates an "infrasonic wave" called "sea voice."
 Shuleykin suggested that detection of these waves could serve as forerunning of approaching storms. The work is being done at Russia's L'vov Polytechnic Institute, which boasts a special magnetic sound recorder for capturing and reproducing sound waves too low in frequency to be heard.
 "Previous efforts of other scientists in this particular field have failed consistently," the paper said. The device converts the sub-audio "sea voice" into higher frequencies which are fed to a picture tube for visual display and study.
