Washington - (UPI) - The Oregon House delegation was split Thursday as the House passed a bill to extend the military conscription program by a vote of 382-20.

Nuclear Talks Remain Bogged

Geneva - (UPI) - East and West ended their 12th week of nuclear test ban negotiations today still without a solution to the veto problem that has hampered the United Nations for nearly 14 years.

The United States and Britain have refused to accept Soviet demands for a veto over virtually every operation of a nuclear control and inspection network. They said it is incompatible with the whole idea of adequate control over a nuclear test ban treaty.

The Russians counter-charged that the Soviet Union could not accept a voting system in a control scheme that would allow an automatic Western majority to enforce its will on Russia.

As yet, neither side has given any indications of a compromise and tempers were reported wearing thin in both camps.

Smoking, Dental Ad Bills Said Dead

Salem - (UPI) - Two controversial bills apparently died Thursday in the House Judiciary Committee.

A proposed bill to lower the smoking age from 18 to 16, and a bill to prohibit advertising by dentists were shelved.

Rep. George Layman (R-Newberg) said he did not believe they would come up again in this session.

Layman said in the case of the advertising bill, it was a case of using police power of the state in solving a problem of one profession.

Layman said the committee may later come up with a bill to straighten out inconsistencies in the cigarette code, but it probably would not provide for lowering the cigarette smoking age.
