

Red Raiders Humble Mountaineers 80-65

La Grande - Gordon Carrigan sparked the Southern Oregon college Red Raiders of the Rogue here Friday night as they subdued the Eastern Oregon Mountaineers 80 to 65 and stayed in the thick of the running for the Oregon Collegiate conference basketball diadem.

Carrigan made 11 of 19 field bucket attempts and all six of his free toss tries for 28 points. He put in six of the fielders from the outside and hit the others at closer range.

Southern Oregon took an early lead in the fracas, EOC caught up at 15-all then Carrigan hit a shot to give the Raiders the front-running spot for keeps. Halftime score was 36 to 31.

The Raiders and Mounties were even on the backboards but the Southerners parlayed an edge in hustle and their hotter shooting into victory. SOC shot 35 of 75 for 46.6 average from the field. Mountie effort was 27 of 78 for 34.6.

Dave D'Olive put in 17 points and Punt Biddington 15 for SOC and Tom Neel 15 for the Mountaineers. Neel was charged with three personal fouls and a technical infraction in the first five minutes of play.

Corvallis - (UP) - Oregon's Ducks got off to a quick lead here Friday night in a Pacific Coast conference game and beat Oregon State, 73-68, for the first time in three meetings this season.

The Ducks slowed down Slat's Gill's Beavers in the opening minutes of the first half with a zone defense and barged in front, 20-7. The Beavers retaliated with a press and were able to narrow the margin to 32-29 at halftime.

However, Oregon came back to go nine points in front again 38-29 in the second half and Oregon State got no closer than two points near the end of the game.

Fouls Tell - Fouls were the telling factor as Oregon State committed 26 infractions - eight more than the Ducks. Oregon State had more field goals but Oregon converted 25 points from the
