



Chairman Attends Meeting

Mrs. John Benson was in Salem last week to attend a meeting called by Mrs. W. T. Nelson, Beaverton, legislative director for the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers. More than 200 representatives from PTA units and councils throughout the state attended. They studied bills which would affect the health, education and welfare of young people and children. Of particular interest was material presented on the state's code of laws concerning juveniles.

Proposed curfew laws and the measure which would lower the compulsory school age from 18 to 16 were studied. There was little support expressed for the latter proposed law, she reported. Most of those attending do favor the establishment of more vocational schools in the state, she said.

It was reported that last year all of the Oregon representatives and senators had made use of the legislation which permits each one to appoint a student for an Oregon State college tuition scholarship. The group also discussed the recommendation to establish a state scholarship board.

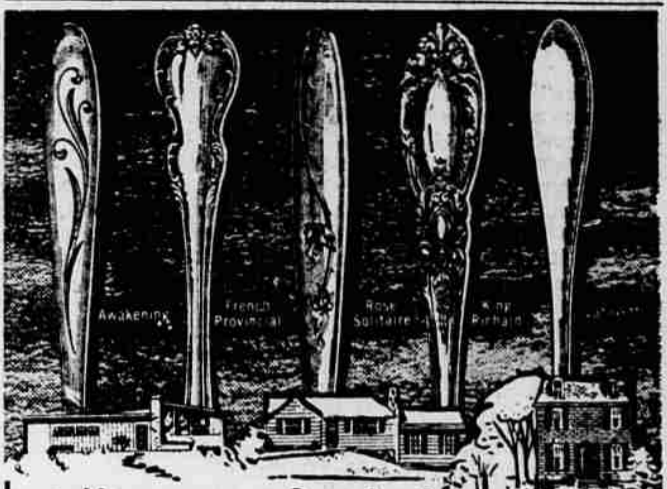
Meeting Announced By Gold Hill Women
