

Bill Dellinger Races To World Indoor Record of 8:49.9 In 2-Mile at Garden

Engene—UPI—Bill Dellinger, University of Oregon track coach, said today he was pleased but not surprised at the 8:49.9 record indoor two mile run by former Web-foot Bill Dellinger in Boston Saturday night. "Bill worked here for about 10 days during the holidays . . . and he was in marvelous condition for so early in the season," Bowerman said.

Boston—UPI—Track officials can thank miler Ron Delany for the United States having a mighty Olympic candidate in two-miler Bill Dellinger.

Dellinger switched from the mile because he was sick of playing second fiddle to the Dublin flyer. Result: An indoor record in the two-mile Saturday night at the Garden. It was the first board attempt at the distance the 25-year-old Air Force ROTC instructor had ever made. Even more surprising, the lieutenant's world mark of 8:49.9

was achieved in a walk-away race in which he romped home by a 50-yard margin over Max Truex, former USC star.

"My next goal?" Dellinger said in answer to the question. "The 1960 Olympics."

Off Outdoor Mark
Though the Springfield, Ore., speedster ranks as the best indoor two-miler right now, he still is far off the outdoor record of 8:32 set by Albert Thomas of Australia last year, nearly 18 seconds faster than Dellinger's mark.

Title Taken By Littler At Phoenix

Phoenix, Ariz. — (UPI) — Gene Littler, labeled only five years ago as the probable successor to Ben Hogan's golf crown, but a flop as a winner for the last two years, is back on his stick.

The blond San Diego links star annexed the Phoenix Open championship Sunday for his first major tournament victory since early 1957.

His putting game is back on the beam and a slight change in his swing has given the three-time winner of the tournament of champions the confidence he needs to be a big winner again.

Back to Putter
"I went back to the putter I used four years ago," said Gene after he had stood off the closing rush of Art Wall to win by a single stroke. "And I putt like a demon all week."

Gene had a closing round of 71 to go with early performances of 67-63-67 for a 268 total — 12 strokes under par for the distance on the Arizona Country club course. The win was worth \$2,400.

There was a three-way tie back of the leaders at 275 for their place between John Mullin, Alameda, Calif.; Marty Furgol, Lemont, Ill.; and Jimmy Clark, Huntington Beach, Calif., each collecting \$1,133.34.

Phoenix—UPI—Bob Duden of Oswego, Ore., finished the Phoenix open golf tournament with a 282 Sunday, good enough to win \$108.33.

Duden had a 74 Sunday and finished 14 strokes behind winner Gene Littler, San Diego, Calif., who had a 268.

Hillsdale May Be Race Rival Of Round Table
Arcadia, Calif. — (UPI) — A possible duel between Round Table and Hillsdale and a \$75,000 race for derby candidates highlight this week's racing at Santa Anita.

Both Hillsdale and Round Table, the big stars in the handicap ranks of the meeting, were nominated for the \$50,000 mile and an eight San Antonio Handicap Saturday, last major prep for the \$145,000 Santa Anita Handicap Feb. 28.

A decision on Round Table's status in the race, however, was withheld pending announcements of weights for the race. Owner Travis M. Kerr had his doubts about running the money-winning champion with even 132 pounds at the meeting.

In Saturday's Santa Margarita, Bug Brush stamped himself as one of the nation's top fillies by picking up 126 pounds and racing to a victory by two and three-quarters lengths in the brilliant time of 1:48 1/5, fastest mile and an eight of the meeting and a new record for the stakes.

USC Noses Idaho
