New Metal Alloy Said To Resist Heat

Columbus, Ohio - (Science Service) - A new metal alloy that is tough, light and heat-resistant has been developed at Ohio State University here. It is made up of three elements - niobium, zirconium and titanium. Their percentages by weight are 48, 49 and 3, respectively. The importance of the alloy is said to be its extreme strength while still being low in density and resistant to oxidation at high temperatures. Several metals have two combinations of these three qualities, but none has all three, according to University engineers. The new alloy is effective at temperatures up to 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit, whereas stainless steel is effective up to about 1,500 degrees.

Hungarian Secret Police Guard Cardinal Mindszenty's Quarters

Vienna - (UPI) - An eight-man squad of Hungarian secret policemen nervously guards the U. S. legation in Budapest day and night, tensing nervously every time either of the two exit doors opens.

At the next corner, two more agents keep their vigil in a pair of patrol cars. When somebody leaves the legation, or civilians approach it, they warm up the engines of the German-built sedans.

These are gunmen at the ready.

These are the prison guards of Jozsef Cardinal Mindszenty.

In the irony of cold war, Mindszenty is a prisoner on American territory. He sought asylum in the legation and now is chained there by the knowledge that Hungary's ruthless Communists will pounce the moment he leaves the small, confining legation structure in downtown Budapest.

Diplomats Only Visitors

A prisoner within the walls of freedom, Mindszenty cannot roam outside the confines of his part of the legation. The only people he sees are those senior diplomats who hold the key to the heavy iron doors behind which he seeks peace and refuge.

Little is known of his life in the American legation in Budapest except that he spends much of his time writing his voluminous memoirs. These will cover many decades, beginning with 1915, when Joseph Pehn (his family name) was ordained a priest. He changed his name in 1940 to the Hungarian name of Mindszenty, thinking his family name sounded too German.

The memoirs will cover the struggle with the Nazis, his imprisonment by them in 1944, his postwar struggle to save the nation from Communist domination, his arrest, torture and trial by the Communists, his eight years in prison, a fleeting glimpse of freedom and his present sanctuary in the American legation.

A large part of the memoirs will deal with his memories of the past eight years in the Communist prisons of "things which are unspeakable and defy the imagination of every normal man."

Mindszenty had been convicted in Budapest on Feb. 8, 1949, by a Communist "People's Court" and sentenced to life imprisonment. Charges against him in the five-day show trial included high treason, espionage and currency transactions.

He is the first prince of the church to face a civil court in modern times and his trial before a handpicked crew of Red goons shocked the peo-

person from the "outside" with whom Mindszenty spoke, who urged him to seek refuge in the nearest diplomatic mission, the American legation. The cardinal scooped up his cassock so he would not be recognized, donned his overcoat and hurried to safety.

Before Mindszenty entered the legation, he told questioning newsmen bitterly, "you don't throw words at a drowning man." He was referring to the way the United Nations and most of its members appeared to have abandoned Hungary.

He was taken out of prison on July 16, 1955, and confined to the premises of a church building. However, he was not allowed to perform his duties as a primate. This suspension was viewed as a well timed peace offering from the Communists on the eve of the summit parley at Geneva.

On Oct. 30, 1956, after the successful first stage of the Hungarian revolution, Mindszenty was freed by Hungarian tank units at Felső Petoeny, northern Hungary, and driven to his old residence in Budapest.

Freedom was short-lived for the Cardinal. As he was conferring with the late premier Imre Nagy, Russian soldiers approached the building and the sounds of shooting could be heard in the background. It was Premier Nagy, the last

Taxes Estimated For State Citizens

Salem - (UPI) - The State Tax Commission estimated Monday that the average Oregon citizen would pay slightly higher taxes under the plan revealed by Gov. Mark Hatfield than he would have under the budget proposed by ex-Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

Compared to present taxes, some Oregonians will pay more and some less under the Hatfield program.

A married man with two dependents and a \$6,000 income now pays \$91. He would have paid \$96 under the Holmes plan and \$112 under Hatfield's.

A single man earning \$6,000 who now pays \$217 would pay \$182 under the Hatfield plan, and \$138 under Holmes' plan.

A single man with a \$3,000 income now pays \$72. Under the Holmes budget he would pay \$48 and under Hatfield's recommendations, \$55.
