Spot Checks of Income Taxes Allowed in Bill

Salem -UPI- Spot checks of state income tax returns would be allowed under terms of Senate bill 48, passed by the Senate Tuesday and sent to the House.

Sen. Ben Musa (D-The Dalles) insisted that the wording in the bill would allow such checks, but Sen. Alfred Corbett (D-Portland) and Sen. Melvin Goode (R-Albany) did not feel that this authority was spelled out clearly enough.

For 15 minutes, the three members debated back and forth and then the bill passed 17-12.

A bill requiring food processors to take advantage of only one of two methods set up to ease payments on inventories also was passed.

Processors Exempt
In 1941, monthly payments were allowed after the assessment date on inventories was set at Jan. 1 at request of farmers and processors who claimed to have unusually large inventories on that date.

Another bill was passed exempting processors from paying taxes on any products shipped from the plant before May 1 of any year.

Some processors have legally claimed both methods of relief, which Sen. Ward Cook (D-Portland) said never was intended by the authors of the bills.

The taxpayers would have to choose one or the other method but not use both under the new bill.

Recovery Continues In Active Market
