

Neuberger Sponsors Bill To Provide Medical Exchange

Washington - Ignorance of scientific investigations completed or underway in other countries represents a major obstacle to progress by medical researchers, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger said Wednesday. "Key to the cause of cancer may now lie in a laboratory test tube in Japan, Poland or Brazil," Neuberger said. "But this magnificent achievement

might be delayed for years because scientists in other nations—who might realize the implications of this information due to their own studies—lack the necessary means of communication to obtain these findings."

Considered Cured

Neuberger—who underwent a cancer operation in August—announced last week that he

considers himself a cured victim of the disease. He told reporters then of plans to increase his efforts to secure legislation aiding medical research.

"Magnitude of the problem is indicated by the fact that many scientific investigators find it less expensive and time-consuming to conduct laboratory experiments anew than to search for previously reported data—even though such data is known to exist," the Oregon senator declared.

Neuberger is co-sponsor of legislation introduced by Sen. Lister Hill of Alabama which would establish domestic administrative machinery to facilitate international sharing of medical research information, coordination of study projects, and exchange of investigative workers. Implementation of the program would be the responsibility of a National Institute for International Medical Research with an annual appropriation of \$50 million.

Signifies Desire

"Enactment of this proposal would further signify to the world, the United States' desire for cooperation, not conflict," Neuberger said. "It would help prepare the way for an international medical year in which scientists, doctors and technicians of all countries could combine to launch a global battle against disease."

International cooperation would not be without immense potential benefits to America itself, the senator asserted. "Despite our vaunted standard of living, the male residents of the United States have shorter life expectancy than seven other countries—Holland, Great Britain, New Zealand, Israel, Norway, Sweden and Denmark," he pointed out.

Bill To Create Fiscal Officer Passes Senate

Salem—UPI—The Oregon Senate has unanimously passed a bill creating the office of state fiscal officer who would be responsible only to the Legislature.

Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D-Milwaukie) unsuccessfully attempted to send the bill back to committee with specific instructions to amend it to provide the fiscal officer to take over post audit duties of the audit division of the secretary of state's office.

Sweetland said he was in favor of the bill but felt it should go further and provide a post audit by the fiscal officer in order to give legislators a more intimate view of state finances.

Buried under Avalanche

However, his motion was buried under an avalanche of "no" votes—22-6—with two senators absent.

Sen. Jean Lewis (R-Portland) made a plea for passage of the bill making it a misdemeanor for any person to abandon a dog or cat in the state. Sen. Walter Leth (R-West Salem) said he felt a clause in the bill "without making adequate provision for proper feeding and shelter" would give the offender an opportunity to escape punishment by setting up a cardboard box for a shelter and leaving food on hand.

Sen. Eddie Ahrens and Rep. Robert Elstrom, Marion county Republicans, introduced a bill appropriating \$100,000 for construction or purchase of a governor's mansion. Similar bills in the past have failed.

COURSE DROPPED

No Decision on Special Vote for Building Bonds

Salem—UPI—Rep. Keith Skelton (D-Eugene) chairman of the House Ways and Means committee, said Wednesday no decision on a special election for state building construction bonds has been made.

Skelton said, however, that if both Republicans and Democrats can agree on issues that perhaps one could be scheduled.

He added that if the bonding program proposed by ex-Gov. Robert D. Holmes was put on the ballot then Gov. Mark Hatfield's plans for a pay-as-you-go building program also might be put before the voters.

Skelton said the biggest reason not to have a special election is its \$250,000 cost.

He said a gentleman's agreement to keep the special election "non-political" would be necessary before the Legislature should consider it.

Would Abolish Board

It would take 60 days from the time a bill is passed before an election could be held.

A bill to abolish the State Board of Control has been introduced in the House by Skelton and 11 others.

The measure would take away from the Board of Control its duties of administering the operations of state institutions and give them to a state director of institutions to be appointed by the governor.

A similar measure which was proposed in 1957 by then Gov. Robert D. Holmes failed to pass. This bill is opposed by Hatfield and Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr.

Health Officers Warned of Influenza

Washington—UPI—U.S. Surgeon General Leroy E. Burney has warned the nation's health officers that it is "probable" that outbreaks of influenza sweeping Europe may hit the United States.

Burney pointed to reports from the World Health Organization of "outbreaks of various types of influenza in several European countries."

"Although no outbreaks of influenza in the United States so far have been reported," Burney said, "further introduction of the disease is probable."

He renewed a recommendation that private physicians give special consideration to the desirability of vaccinating the aged, the chronically ill, pregnant women, hospital staffs and industrial and service groups where absenteeism would create serious disruption.

POSSIBLE SUCCESSOR

Washington—UPI—Dr. Warren C. Johnson, dean of physical sciences at the University of Chicago, was mentioned Wednesday as a possible successor to Dr. Willard F. Libby as a member of the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission. Libby has not formally resigned, but he is expected to leave the commission June 30.

PLANE SETS RECORD

New York—UPI—A commercial airliner record of four hours and five minutes from San Francisco to New York was set Wednesday by a Trans World Airlines Boeing 707 jet on a pilot training flight. The old mark was four hours and 38 minutes.

1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon other flavoring
1/2 cup boiling water
1 cup tiny marshmallows
