The Family Council

The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Eloise R. - They don't ask me to their parties.

Jim R. - She wouldn't enjoy our parties.

Eloise R. - I am a widow living alone just a few blocks away from my only son. I keep active and I think I'm doing a good job of being independent in spite of my years (nearly 70) and my poor health.

I don't expect anything from my children, but I do think they might have a little more consideration for me. For example, my son and his wife often give parties and they know how much I enjoy getting out among people, but they never ask me.

It often embarrasses me to learn from someone else that my children had a big party and I knew nothing about it. What harm would I do their parties? I am not loud or demanding and people like me. There is no reason for them to be ashamed of me. I have hidden my feelings in the past, but now I feel too hurt to keep quiet about it.

Jim R. - Mother has been hinting for a long time that she would like to be invited to our parties. Of course, we are always glad to see Mother, but I feel that it is up to my wife to work out a guest list. My wife's idea is that everyone at a party should fit in just right. She thinks people are annoyed and embarrassed when someone of older age or of very different outlook stands out at the party like a sore thumb.

I have tried to explain to Mother that she wouldn't enjoy our parties. There is a bit too much drinking for her taste and sometimes things get a little raucous. None of this is actually wild, but we think our friends might feel a bit inhibited if Mother were around and we want them to have a good time.

Mother really has put us on the spot. We didn't mean to hurt her.

The Council: We don't think that older people ought to expect to participate in the social gatherings of the younger. They shouldn't feel left out because of this. They ought to have their own social gatherings with their own age group and they are privileged to exclude the younger set at those times. It is rather unfair of Eloise to intimidate her children on this score.

However, we don't entirely go along with Jim's wife's idea that nobody at a party should stand out like a "sore thumb." These sore thumbs can inject a little fresh life into a gathering. Too much sameness is the death of many parties and possibly one of the causes of the need for more alcohol to inject some spirit into the proceedings. There are times an older person or an "odd one" can make quite a social contribution.

In other words, we feel that while Eloise shouldn't ex-

pect to be invited, it might be a good idea for Jim and his wife to experiment by inviting her to "drop by for a little while" when they are having a gathering they think might be enjoyable for her. She should make a point of just "dropping by" and not staying for the entire evening. Even fully grown, married children are sometimes upset by the presence of a parent. They have a right to independent friendship and entertainment.

Like many elderly persons, Eloise doesn't like the creeping sense she has of being left out of the main stream of things. It is a natural feeling, but participation in the lives of children is no answer. She should try to participate more actively in the life of her generation.
