



Permanent Effects Of Centennial Said To Be Immeasurable

Portland—UPI—The permanent effects of a successful Centennial in Oregon can be immeasurable.

An almost year-long succession of pageants, festivals, cultural displays, and historical exhibits, beginning Feb. 14, will attract world and national attention to each of our 36 counties, 214 cities, and scenic rural areas.

Centennial fervor will unify Oregon's 1.7-million citizens, in a non-partisan and non-sectarian cause. We will learn again "the language of Oregon," foreign to so many Oregonians—a simple knowledge of our historical hereditage, our geography, topography, and economy.

Each An Ambassador
It is expected that somewhere between six and eight million out-of-state visitors will be our guests this year. We must "fan out" these new friends from Chicago and Cairo, Tallahassee and Tel Aviv. Accordingly, each Oregonian should be able to an-

swer with authority questions about his own home town, about fishing and hunting, historical sites, lumbering and mining. In short, each Oregonian is to be an ambassador in his backyard.

Further, we must be able to answer questions about other areas in our state. Lakeview should be able to discuss salmon fishing at Astoria. Pendleton should be aware of the mineral riches near Bend; Eugene should be prepared to describe the beauties of travel on Highway 101. Once a city is entertaining visitors, it should do its best to refer them to other beautiful parts of the state.

We will reap a revitalizing economic fruit at year-end 1959, if we expend the energy to become good hosts.

The out-of-state visitor will probably spend 6½ days in Oregon—two at the Portland Centennial Exposition and the balance touring Oregon. An average expenditure of \$37 per tourist (based on 1958 data) would mean around 300 million dollars in visitor income during 1959, contrasted with 150 million dollars (from out-of-staters) in 1958. SP Freight Car Fleet Increased

San Francisco—Southern Pacific took delivery on 2,349 freight cars during 1958, raising its total freight car fleet to more than 81,000, President Donald J. Russell said today.

Continuation of this program will bring delivery this month of the first of 1,450 specialized cars to be acquired in 1959, at a cost of about \$22 million, Russell said.

First freight cars to be received will be 100 85-foot piggy-back cars.

Fifty of the cars ordered will be light-weight passenger cars. These cars will be used primarily for mail, baggage and express.

Russell said 500 wide-door box cars, suitable for mechanical loading of freight such as long lumber and plywood, will be off assembly lines beginning in April.

Eight hundred insulated box cars, with special loading equipment and Hydra-Cushion underframes developed by Southern Pacific and Stanford Research Institute for safe handling of fragile freight, will begin arriving in July.

In addition, Russell reported, the first of 70 new diesel locomotives, ordered by SP at a cost of \$13.5 million, will be delivered next month.

Southern Pacific previously announced its capital improvements program for 1959 will total about \$80 million.

Circuit Court Judge James Main Tuesday suspended imposition of a two-year sentence to the Oregon State penitentiary for Lewis Edward Parcel, 71, Rogue River, for burglary not in a dwelling. Parcel had pleaded guilty to breaking into Ernie's Builder's Supply, Rogue River, on Aug. 30, by opening a side window.

Tuesday afternoon Judge Main appointed Robert Heffernan, Medford, as attorney for Daniel E. Roach, 39, of 927 Siskiyou blvd., Ashland. Roach was arraigned on district attorney's information charging him with issuing a false check.

William Robert Eberhardt, 36, of Ashland, waived a grand jury and entered a plea of guilty to district attorney's information charging him with uttering and publishing a false check.
