Nasal Inhaler Sales Restricted

Washington—(UPI)—The Food and Drug administration has banned over-the-counter sales of a nasal inhaler reportedly used by teenagers for getting "kicks."

From now on, the order issued Tuesday said, a doctor's prescription will be required on all sales of nasal inhalers containing basic amphetamine.

Amphetamine in a drug used in so-called "pep" pills which also are restricted to prescription sales.

The order was based on evidence that the inhalers were being misused for non-medical purposes by persons who removed the wicks and used the drug as a substitute for amphetamine tablets. FDA officials said.

Similar misuse of benzadrine inhalers a few years ago resulted in restricted sale of them.

Eisenhower Has No Plan To Replace Dulles

Washington—(UPI)—President Eisenhower made it crystal clear Wednesday that he has no intention of replacing his ailing friend, John Foster Dulles, as secretary of state. Dulles is in the Army Walter Reed hospital awaiting an operation for hernia. He expects to be back at work in "a few weeks."
