Firm Contributes \$1.4 Million to Plan

Employees of Western Auto Supply company here were notified this week that the company has contributed approximately \$1,400,000 to its profit sharing and retirement program for 1958.

Of the amount, \$900,000 went into the profit sharing trust fund and \$500,000 into the retirement trust. The profit sharing sum amounted to approximately five weeks' base pay for each of the 1,976 participants in the program.

Participation in the program by full-time employees begins after three years' service with the company. Profit sharing funds are credited to the account of each participant, who is given an annual statement of his total credits and a complete accounting of the performance of the fund for the preceding year.

Suit Challenges Textbook Law

Oregon City - (UPI) - A taxpayer's suit challenging the constitutionality of the Oregon free textbook law was filed in Circuit Court here today.

The law directs all public school districts to provide textbooks for use by grade school students in "standard schools."

Dr. Judah Bierman of Portland, Oregon chairman of the American Civil Liberties Union, said the union considers a court test of the constitutionality of the law necessary and proper. He said:

"Supplying textbooks at public expense for use in parochial schools breaches the wall of separation of church and state. Such action constitutes a form of state aid to religious institutions. The ACLU believes the sanctity of religion and the integrity of the state are both best protected when the activities of both are kept separate."
