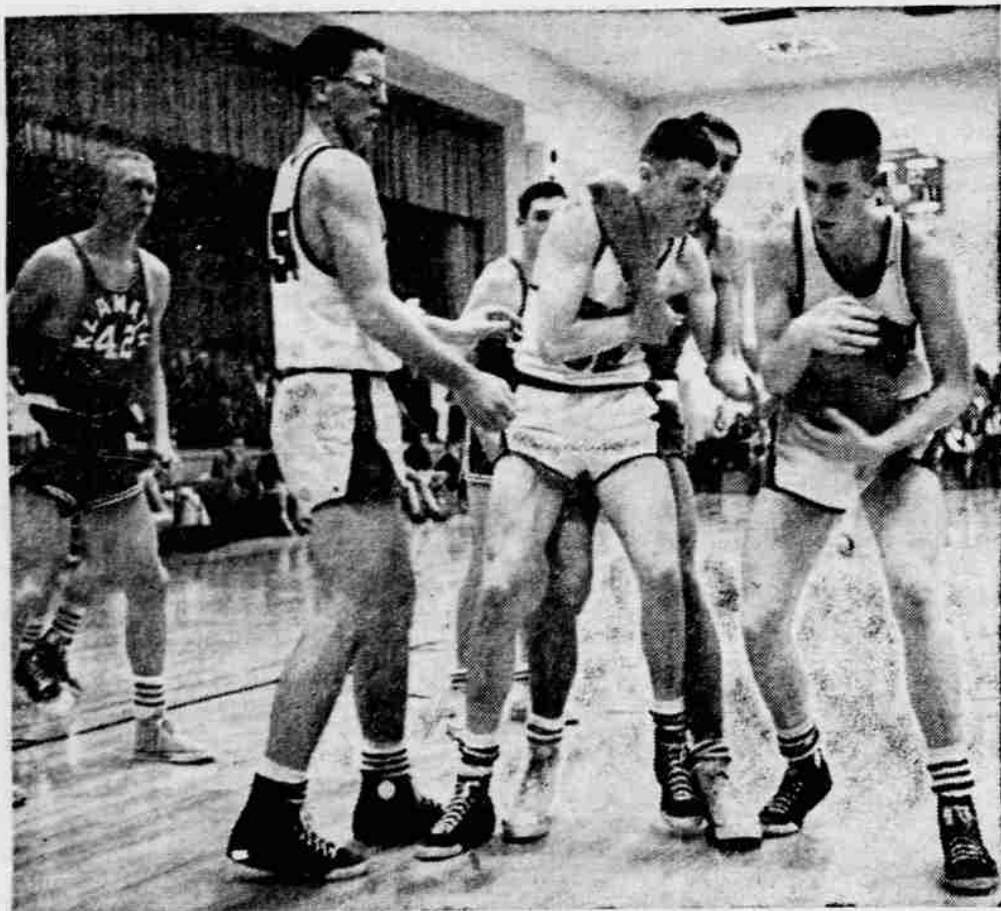

Klamath Union High school's Pelicans, on the short end of the count for 3½ periods except for one brief tie, yielded in on opportunities cashed by the Black Tornado in the spine-tangler fourth quarter and overtime to nose its Medford adversary 49 to 47 in a Southern Oregon conference basketball game at Hedrick gym here Friday night.

All-star Bob Peterson dumped in the winning field goal with 24 seconds left in the extra canto. It was the only field shot attempted by the Pelicans in the added period and marked the first time the Klamath club was ahead during the entire ball game. Klamath Falls, defending state A-1 titlist and twice-in-a-row Southern Oregon loop winner, made a big gain toward a third straight District 6 banner with the victory. The Pelicans boosted their bulge over second place Medford to 1½ games.

Outcome also narrowed the gap between the Tornado and third spot Grants Pass to one-half game. Grants Pass topped Crater 71 to 58. Klamath, Medford and GP are the chief battlers in the race for two state tourney berths. Crater, however, was still in the running.

8-Point Medford Edge

Medford led by an eight-point spread of 39 to 31 after three quarters of the high pitched tangle which was played to the hustling hit by both aggregations. Bob Peterson and Bob Deakins with their work under the hoop and Don DeLap with his driving gunned the Pelicans to their 16 to 8 edge over Medford in the fourth stanza to send the game into overtime in probably the top fracas seen on the Medford maplecourt this season.

The Pels closed up their deficit steadily in the No. 4 panel. Petersen put in a rebound shot and DeLap sank a dribble-in goal off a jump ball. Deakins swiped the ball under the Medford hoop, passed to DeLap then netted a shot after DeLap passed back to him. Score was then 39 to 37 for Medford.

Booth Deakins scored for the Tornado off a pass from George Koch. DeLap retaliated with a driver but Lowell Dean looped the ball through on another Koch feed for Medford and a 43 to 39 standing. Deakins then hit a jump from the side and DeLap a 15-footer to tie the game at 43-43.

Dean sank a bucket from the side of the free lane for 45 to 43. Petersen tied the fust again with a closey on a pass-in but muffed a Klamath

go ahead chance when a free shot failed to go in. Medford Leads 47-45. A Ken Durkee interception set up another Dean goal with 1 minute 22 seconds to play. That made it 47 to 45 for the Tornado.

Medford broke up the next offensive effort of the Pelicans but with 50 seconds left on the clock George Koch loosed a long howitzer. It didn't go through the hoop and Klamath nabbed the rebound. Petersen put in a fast break with 40 seconds to go to tie the game at 47 each. With 16 seconds left in the regular playing time Medford took time out to consider its strategy. Durkee fired a final shot at the buzzer but it was wide of the mark.

In the overtime Dean fouled Deakins in a tie-up with two minutes left but the KUHS player missed the free try. In the next minute field attempts by Dean and Deakins failed for Medford. With 59 seconds to play Klamath called time to map its strategy and with 24 seconds on the clock DeLap fed the ball in to Petersen who put in his winning jumper. Medford took a pause with 21 seconds left. Jerry Anderson made a final but futile try for the Tornado. The Pels nabbed possession of the ball and held it until time ran out.

Petersen Scores 23 Petersen was the big point man of the evening with 23 markers, firing in 10 of 13 attempts from the field. He led his team also with 10 rebounds. Anderson totalled 14 markers for Medford and Deakins was the main backboard retrieve man with 12. Medford dominated three quarters of the engagement with some terrific ballhawking, battling under the backboards and gang guarding against the Pelicans by all hands, but Petersen's work under the boards and Don DeLap's driving gave the Tornado a lot of trouble. The Tornado had a 35 to 31 edge in rebounding for the evening.

Klamath's stiff defense around the hoop at times was hard to crack although half the field shots that Medford swished through the hemp were from close range.

Neither team had a good night at the free toss line where Klamath actually picked up the scoring difference in the game. The Pels made seven of 19 free throws and Medford three of 10. Medford had the field goal nod 22 to 21.

Grants Pass Trims Crater High 71-58

Central Point—A massive 30-point scoring spree in the third quarter was the major ingredient Friday night when the Grants Pass high basketball crew defeated Crater 71 to 58 at Grants Pass in a Southern Oregon conference scuffle.

The Comets of Crater held the edge through the first half of the conflict but in third quarter GP got the jump, picked up confidence which made its offense roll and ramfaged while holding the Central Point aggregation to just 10 points.

Crater, ahead by five points at one time in the opening half, had leads of 11 to 7 at the first period stop and 25 to 24 at the halfway pause. Grants Pass headed 54 to 35 at the three fourths rest. The Comets perked up again in the fourth chukker but by then GP was too far in front.

Big John Fox, back in action for the GP Cavenmen, poked in six field goals against the Comet zone defense and he made five free tosses for 17 points and high honors for the night. Crater teamed to hold Grants Pass's Rex Brenner to two points in the first half and the Cavenman starter also had three fouls assessed against him in

that time. But he collected 13 markers in the second half for a 15 tabulation.

John Burns had 14 points for Crater.

Crater had a 27 to 24 gap just as the halftime buzzer sounded Friday but Rodger Burton was awarded free shot chance as the signal sounded and made two for the midway standing. Burton made a goal off the third quarter tip-off to get the Cavenmen off on their big spurt of the night.

Monmouth—Southern Oregon, fighting to keep in the running for the Oregon Collegiate conference basketball diadem, had to spurt in the final minutes Friday night to overcome the upset bid of Oregon College of Education.

The Red Raiders of SOC came out on top 70 to 64 after lagging much of the second half. The Red Raiders of the Rogue grabbed the lead for good at 64 to 63 on a field basket by Punk Biddington. Gordon Carriagan put in a set shot and Jim McCabe two giffers for 68 to 63. The Wolves of Monmouth put in a last free toss and with four seconds to play Dave D'Oliveo connected on a jumper for the Raiders' last score.

Biddington topped the scoring with 22 points while Dave D'Oliveo had 17 markers and 20 rebounds. Dennis Spencer had 15 points and Don Sherk
