Blanche Thebom To Give Concert Here Wednesday

Blanche Thebom, noted mezzo-soprano, will appear in Medford Wednesday, February 18, at 8 p.m. at the Medford High school auditorium. The concert will be the third this season under the auspices of Jackson County Civic Music association.

Miss Thebom, who was born in Pennsylvania and brought up in Ohio, became a secretary following her high school education.

Always musical, she first realized the potential importance of her talent on a trip to Sweden with her parents, when she was heard during a shipboard concert by Marian Anderson's former accompanist.

On her return home Miss Thebom decided to study seriously and left for New York City. Heard by S. Hurok in her teacher's studio, the mezzo-soprano was signed by him and presented in her New York concert debut at Town Hall in 1944. The debut was an unqualified success and she was signed almost at once by the Metropolitan Opera company.

In June, 1957 she performed as Dido in "The Trojans" at London's Royal Opera house, Covent Garden, and toured throughout South and Central America.

In the middle of the San Francisco Opera season she was summoned to New York City to sing for Britain's Queen Elizabeth, and then, on an invitation from the Soviet Ministry of Culture, she flew to Moscow.

She is the first American

woman ever to sing in Moscow's Bolshoi Opera house and the first American woman concert artist to appear in Russia in more than two decades.

This past summer after her Metropolitan Opera season, she sang for the United States at the Brussels World's Fair. The Metropolitan Opera company star will sing in Medford during the course of her annual coast-to-coast tour of 30 cities under the direction of S. Hurok.

Attendance at the concert will be by season membership ticket only, the association reminded residents.
