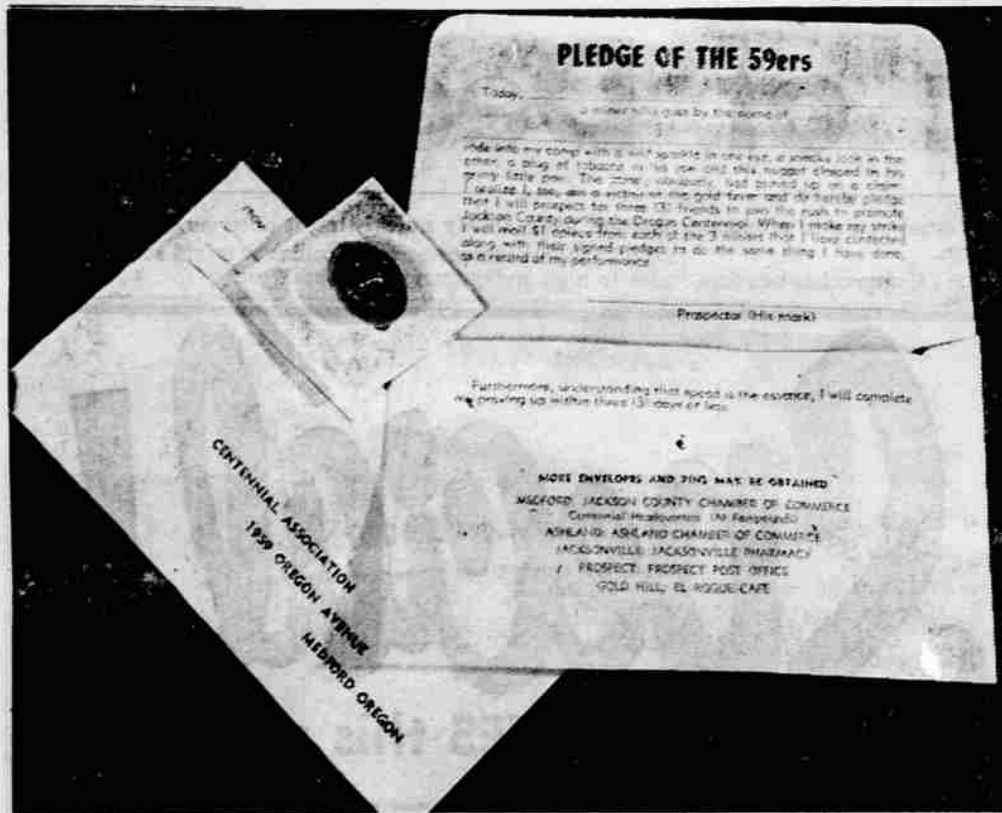

RECORD IMPROVES

Hatfield's Program Duncan Declares Violated Deadline,

Salem—UPI—House Speaker Robert Duncan said Thursday Gov. Mark Hatfield's tax program was presented to the House after the 25th day deadline.

Any bill presented after the deadline must be approved by the House Rules Committee before it can be considered.

Duncan said the Hatfield presentation was "in violation of House rule 28 and if the Democrats were inclined to stymie his program, this would be the time to do it."

But Duncan said he would appear before the Rules Committee and ask it to permit the "tardy introduction" of the bills so the legislature would have a chance to review them.

The speaker said the rule against introduction of bills after the 25th day had been commented on many times this session in an effort to get bills introduced early.

The speaker said that the cost of the 1959 legislative session was running at from \$7,000 to \$10,000 a day and that was the reason he had urged the governor to "give us his tax and budgetary recommendations early."

After considerable argument, the House passed a bill requiring licenses for salt water fishing for salmon and steelhead at Depoe Bay.

The ocean-going fleet at Depoe Bay is the only one in Oregon that does not require a license for such fishing.

Rep. W. O. Kelsay (D-Roseburg) carried the bill on the floor despite 18 opposing votes.

Kelsay said the law would help protect Oregon gamefish and would not be harmful to tourist trade.

Plans to Reorganize Reserve Being Made

San Francisco—Plans to reorganize the Army reserve similar to the regular Army's "Pentomic" concept are being implemented in the Sixth Army area, Lt. Gen. Charles D. Palmer, commanding general, has announced.

The change, which must be completed by Dec. 31, 1960, will make the reserve organization identical to that of the regular army, he said.

The Sixth Army area includes Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Nevada, California and Arizona.

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Pasternak Irked By Publication of Poem in London

Moscow —UPI—A visibly shaken Boris Pasternak today bitterly complained that a British reporter betrayed his trust by publishing without his authorization a poem the Russian poet-author said was written in a "black, pessimistic mood."

Pasternak came under heavy fire from the Communists after the Nobel committee awarded him the 1958 prize for literature. He rejected the prize and the \$40,000 award which went with it because his novel, "Dr. Zhivago," had become controversial.

Pasternak said a British reporter had volunteered to deliver the poem to Pasternak's friend, Jaqueline de Proyart, curator of the Tolstoy Museum in Paris. He denounced the reporter and swore he would receive no more correspondents who "only hinder my work and cause me harm."

Free Expression Fight

The London Daily Mail last Wednesday published a poem which reporter Anthony Brown said Pasternak gave him for publication after a three-hour interview. Brown was in Moscow to cover the 21st Soviet Communist Party congress.

The newspaper, in a copyrighted story, said that Pasternak called the poem "The Nobel Prize." Brown cited the poem as proof that Pasternak was continuing his struggle with the Soviet Writers' Union for the right of free expression of religious and political beliefs.

Pasternak disputed this in a signed statement given to UPI.

The statement said: "The poem was given to Brown as
