CHRISTIAN G. ANDERSON
Ashland — Christian G. Anderson, 76, of 215 Old Pacific highway, Talent, died Feb. 15 at a local rest home. He had been in failing health for the past five years.

Mr. Anderson was born Jan. 1, 1883, in Minneapolis, Minn., and married Ida Estella Hawkins, Feb. 26, 1913, in Albany, Ore. They moved to Talent in 1946. He was a member of the First Christian church.

His wife died April 24, 1938, and a son, Thomas, was killed in action in the South Pacific in 1945.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Helen Williams, Medford, and Mrs. Shirley Hoffman, Portland; and four grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday, Feb. 18, at 2 p.m. at the Rev. Raymond W. Hurn officiating.

Interment will be in the Medford Memorial mausoleum.

Mr. King was born at High Point, Iowa, May 12, 1878, and had been a resident of this community for 26 years and of the state for 30 years.

He received his education at the John Fletcher college, Oskaloosa, Iowa, and was a retired minister, having served in the church for 47 years.

He organized the local First Church of the Nazarene here in 1921.

Survivors include his wife, Myrtle L. King; one son, Col. H. E. King, Arlington, Va.; one brother, H. M. King, Oskaloosa, Iowa; one sister, Mrs. J. R. Martin, LaFayette, Ga.; and four grandchildren.

Active pallbearers will be L. C. House, Fred Hall, Henry Paulson, Arnold Kornstad, F. Stiehl and Clarence Starkey. Honorary pallbearers will be H. M. Von Stein, Loren Scheele, Charles Leschensky, Holly Michael, Fred Calkins and T. D. Satterfield.

Judge Bailey resigned from the high court in November of 1930. He was named to the position in January of 1933 and served as chief justice from 1933 to 1945.

Survivors include his widow, Verna; a son, Jason of Portland; and two daughters, Mrs. O. Verle White, Forest Grove, and Mrs. Vernon Hedges, Boulder, Colo.

Judge Bailey served in both the Oregon House and Senate during the 1920s and before that practiced law in Spokane and Portland. He also served as an assistant attorney general of Oregon from 1915 to 1920.

Norfolk & Western led the rails higher with a gain of two points. Panhandle Eastern Pipe line rose more than a point in the utilities. Lukens Steel, up more than two points, featured a higher steel section. Northwest Airlines rose two points. American Telephone at its high was up more than a point.

Wilson set a new high in the packers. Chain belt rose more than three in the specials.

Killed besides Mrs. Reeves were her grandchildren, Wilbur Parker, 10; Terry Parker, 8; Harold Pittman, 7; Laurel Pittman, 3; Jeannie Pittman, 18 months and Mary Elizabeth Pittman, 6 months.
