## Union 'Safeguard' Boy Scouts Bill Introduced

Salem - (UPI) - Rep. Stafford Hansell (R-Athena) Friday introduced a measure which he called "an attempt to safeguard the rights of unions."

The measure would call for election of union officers at least every four years with voting by secret ballot and candidates permitted to watch opening and tabulating of votes.

Other provisions call for all members with dues paid eligible to vote, at least five percent of the membership required to nominate and no money from any employer or union used to promote any candidate.

It also would call for the secretary of state its constitution and by laws, plus a statement on its finances and rules. It also asks a complete financial report filed yearly.

Under Hansell's measure, officers could be removed by majority vote for cause after notice and hearing.
