Too Many Senior Officers in Navy

Washington—UPI—The Navy has asked Congress for help in eliminating a surplus of experienced senior officers.

Navy Secretary Thomas S. Gates Jr. appealed to a House armed services subcommittee to approve legislation designed to help solve "this serious personnel problem."

Gates said the Navy now has 8,000 commanders and lieutenant commanders to squeeze into 2,000 captain posts. The Marines, he said, have 3,000 lieutenant colonels and majors for 580 colonel jobs.

One handicap to making the Jackson county area more attractive to industry is that banking facilities here are "a little too general," Fred Jeddeloh, coowner and cofounder of Jeddeloh Brothers Sweets Mills, Inc., Gold Hill, told the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce Round Table yesterday noon.

"Manufacturing industry has special needs of its own," Jeddeloh said. "Nobody in the local banks are able to discuss industrial problems and not just from the standpoint of making loans."

personnel educated in industrial engineering.

Local bank officials contacted said they do have men familiar with industrial financing in their systems, although not locally. It would not be economically feasible to keep such men in local bank offices, they said.

Craftsmen of all types applied for jobs when the plant was organized at Gold Hill. This was a surprise, Jeddeloh said. These people came to southern Oregon because they could not stand the congestion of the larger metropolitan centers, Jeddeloh said.

Located at Gold Hill, the plant can draw from skilled labor supplies of Grants Pass and Medford, the Gold Hill industrialist said. The plant was constructed at Gold Hill because the property adjacent to the Southern Pacific railroad tracks was available, he explained.

Gross sales volume was half million dollars last year, and the company expects to double that this year, Jeddeloh said.

Floor Space Added — Approximately 8,000 square feet of floor space was added to the plant last year and 6,000 square feet will be added this spring, he said.

"We have an engineering department and probably spend a greater proportion of our money in research and development than any equivalent firm. There is no better way to assure our future," he added.

The Gold Hill plant employs 35 men in its shop. It was increased from 5 or 6 men to its present number in 1956, he explained. None of the work is "farmed out," since the company is "fussy" about quality and could not be sure of maintaining high standards if the work is given in part to other firms," Jeddeloh said.

The company has developed three precision-type pieces of equipment for the lumber and plywood industry, the gang-saw, veneer dryer feeder and veneer saw.

Visit Valley — The Jeddeloh brothers, Otto and Fred, visited the valley in 1948 and were impressed with the beauty of the valley and the friendly people.

Through their original experience with a sawmill at Gold Hill, they adapted a German gang saw to western lumbermill conditions and because of the extreme accuracy of the saw were able to get 30 per cent over-run in cuttings from a log. The brothers realized they had a saleable product and went into production of it. It proved popular immediately, Jeddeloh said.

When in 1956-57 the lumber market declined the brothers saw the need for diversification and started development of plywood manufacturing machinery.
