

San Francisco To Play St. Mary's Gaels Tonight; Huskies Swamp Trojans

The San Francisco Dons get another chance to regain some of their past glory tonight at the expense of the St. Mary's Gaels and they won't have to improve much on their last performance against the Moraga club to pull off a major upset.

The last time the two squads met, St. Mary's had all it could do to pull out a narrow 64-63 over-time victory

in what was supposed to be a cake-walk for the West Coast Athletic conference leaders.

The Gaels' 6-0 conference mark will be on the line, while the Dons have nothing to lose save another game. USF takes a 1-4 league record into tonight's contest and a miserable 4-15 mark on the season.

The WCAC's second place club, College of Pacific, meets Santa Clara at San Jose Civic auditorium in an important match for both teams. COP (5-2) must win to stay within hailing distance of St. Mary's, while the same goes for the Broncos (4-3) if they are to stay in the running for second place.

In the top game of a light bill Monday night, the Washington Huskies put on a second half rush to swamp Southern California, 76-55, and move to within a half game of pace-setting California in the tight Pacific Coast conference race.

The victory was the Seattle club's seventh straight after dropping three of its first four PCC starts.

The Huskies, trailing 37-33 at halftime, found the range in the opening minutes of the final period and from that point on it was no contest.

Doug Smart collected 26 points for the winners to run his total in three years of PCC play to 884, only 24 behind the conference record set by Oregon State's Dave Gambee.

Bruno Boin contributed 21 markers to the Washington cause. John Werhas led the Trojans with 14 points.

In an inter-sectional at Denver, Portland's Pilots withstood a late rally by Regis to take a 69-64 victory. The visitors had a comfortable 42-28 halftime lead, but Regis shaved it to 62-60 with only four minutes left before the Pilots regained command on the strength of free throws.

Bob Linnenberger led the Ranger attack with 23 points, Jim Armstrong had 15 for Portland.

At Spokane, Seattle reversed a loss to Gonzaga Sunday night by coasting to an 88-68 victory over the Bulldogs.

College of Idaho defeated Willamette, 57-47, in the night's other tilt.

In other games tonight, San Francisco State will host Sacramento State. Westmont travels to Santa Barbara and the Cal Aggies are at Chico State.

Tar Heels Take First Place In UPI Cage Poll

New York (UPI)—The North Carolina Tar Heels, aided by Kentucky's loss to Mississippi State, took over first place today in United Press International's college basketball ratings for the first time since Dec. 17, 1957. Kentucky slipped from first to third.

Coach Frank McGuire's Tar Heels, beaten only by Michigan State in 17 starts, moved up from second. Kansas State (19-1) advanced from third to second.

The 35 leading coaches who rate the nation's major col-

leges for UPI also made several other changes in the top 10. The coaches considered games played through Saturday night in their latest balloting.

Mississippi State (20-1) advanced from 15th to 10th and appeared in the select group for the first time since the UPI ratings were inaugurated in 1950. California (15-4) advanced from 12th to ninth.

Bradley, beaten last week by St. Louis, slipped from eighth to 12th. West Virginia upset by New York University, dropped from 10th to 14th.

Cincinnati (16-2), North Carolina State (18-2), Auburn (18-0) and Michigan State (13-3) remained 4-5-6-7. St. Louis (16-2) moved from ninth to eighth.

Texas Christian (16-4), the Southwest Conference leader, headed the second 10 group. Bradley, Utah, West Virginia, Marquette, Louisville, St. John's (N.Y.), St. Bonaventure, Oklahoma City, and St. Mary's, Calif., followed in order. No other schools received votes this week.

Kansas State Eyes Conference Title

Kansas State and Michigan State moved closer to conference championships and berths in the NCAA basketball tournament today, while Auburn looked ahead to placing its 30-game victory streak on the line against Kentucky later this week.

Second-ranked Kansas State remained undefeated in Big Eight Conference action by polishing off Oklahoma, 75-55, Monday night and can clinch at least a tie for the league title by defeating Oklahoma State Saturday.

Michigan State, also picking up steam with each game, opened a two-game lead in the Big Ten race in turning back Northwestern, 71-68. The seventh-ranked Spartans need only two victories in their remaining four games to win the conference title and a crack at the NCAA championship.

Auburn Downs Tulane
Auburn, barred from any postseason appearances, displayed amazing shooting in its final tuneup for Kentucky by downing Tulane, 79-56. The sixth-ranked Tigers converted 31 of 53 shots from the field and added 17 of 22 free throws in scoring their 30th straight victory.

Kansas State also was red-hot against Oklahoma. The Wildcats hit on 41.4 per cent of their field goal attempts and 27 of 31 free throws in scoring their 20th triumph in 21 games. Bob Boozer led Kansas State with 21 points, one more than Oklahoma's Ray Lewis.

A field goal by Dave Fahs and two free throws by Bob Anderson in the final minutes helped carry Michigan State to victory over Northwestern. The Wildcats, led by Willie Jones' 30 points, put up a strong fight as the score was tied six times in the first half and four times in the second half.

Purdue provided the Spartans with an important boost by knocking off Indiana, 94-89, and tying the Hoosiers for second place. Michigan State plays Purdue Saturday and then takes on Indiana the following week end. If the Spartans win those two crucial games, they can start lining up tickets to the NCAA tournament.

Bradley Cries Reveng
Bradley bounced out of the UPI top 10 this week, gained revenge for last week's defeat to St. Louis by snapping the Billikens' 14-game winning streak, 72-65. The Braves and St. Louis now are tied for second in the Missouri Valley Conference race behind Cincinnati.

Van Smith and Mike Owens each scored 19 points for Bradley, which converted 28 of 48 field goal attempts. George Burkel had 23 points and Bob Ferry totaled 19 for the eighth-ranked Billikens.

Dellinger Winner in Two-Mile

New York (UPI)—Bill Dellinger, ex-Oregon ace, won the two-mile at the New York Athletic Club games Saturday night with a time 8:59.8, well off his record indoor pace of a week ago.

Jim Grelle of Oregon finished third in the mile behind Phil Coleman of Chicago and Laszla Tabori of Hungary. Dave Edstrom of Oregon was third in the 60-yard high hurdles.

North Salem and Jefferson hung onto their first and second place ratings, respectively, in the class A-1 group but received fewer points than in last week's poll.

North Salem (17-2) gained only three first place votes and it poll points dropped from 96 to 88. However, this makes the third straight week the team has been in first place in the poll.

Grid Team Father Dies At Age 71

New York (UPI)—Timothy J. (Tim) Mara, founder and guiding genius of the New York football Giants, whose franchise he purchased as a \$2,500 whim in 1925, died of a heart attack at his home Monday night at the age of 71.

Mara's wife, Giant team physician Dr. Francis Sweeney, and a parish priest were at his bedside when the end came.

He had never seen football played when Joe Carr, then president of the National Football League, urged him to purchase the New York franchise.

It proved a successful gamble for the aggressive Mara, who watched the Giants capture the world professional championship in 1927, 1934, 1938 and 1956 as well as win the Eastern Division title 10 different times.

Under the Mara banner, such greats as Ken Strong, Ed Danowski, Tuffy Leamans, Mel Hein, Ward Cuff and Kink Richards performed in Giant moleskins. More recently, the team has boasted such stars as Arnie Weinmeister, Ray Poole, Frank Gifford and Charley Conerly. Gifford and Conerly led the Giants to the Eastern Division title this past season but the team bowed to the Baltimore Colts in a championship game last December.
