Plans, Specifications Adopted For Berrydale Sanitary Sewer

Plans and specifications for the proposed Berrydale sanitary sewer were unanimously adopted at last night's Medford city council meeting.

City Manager Robert A. Duff, in recommending the adoption, reported that the estimated costs and an ordinance calling for a public hearing on the project would be presented at the March 5 council meeting.

Plans and specifications for paving East Jackson st. between Bear Creek and Genesee st. to a width of 52 feet were also adopted last night. A public hearing on this project was called for March 5.

Public Hearing - Another public hearing, on proposed assessments at \$2.35 per front foot for the water main along Barnett rd. from Stewart ave. to Riverside ave., was called for March 19.

Two public hearings on matters recommended by the city planning commission were called. One, on re-zoning the area bounded by Court st., North Riverside ave. and Ohio st. from residential to light industrial, was called for March 5. The other, on vacating Mungus st., was called for April 2.

The council approved a zoning variance allowing a sub-standard setback for apartment units erected at 825 East Ninth st., thus resolving an issue that arose last September.

Permit Issued - A Medford building permit was issued Wednesday to M. A. Kurnstad for \$1,100 in repairs to a residence at 408 North Ivy st.

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ment units erected at 825 East Ninth st., thus resolving an issue that arose last September.

Owners Complain - The city building department had entered a violation order against the contractor only after the units were completed. Adjacent property owners complained that the sidewalk setbacks of the units were below the minimum specified in the city's zoning ordinance. The contractor, James Boyce of Watkins Construction company, asserted that he had erected them according to plans approved at city hall.

The complainants subsequently agreed they would be satisfied if the units were cut back to five feet from the lot lines, if a four-foot cyclone fence was erected along the lot lines and if the intervening ground was graded to prevent excessive run-off of rain water.

These conditions, Duff reported last night, have been met. Basis for the variance is that forcing the contractor to move the units back to the required setback would have involved an excessive hardship.

The council heard a report from Duff that possibilities are being explored for rerouting the proposed Eastover terrace sanitary sewer or readjusting the project in hopes

of obtaining lower bids.

Original bids were rejected last month as being too far above the engineer's estimate.

Dr. Lawrence Ellis, an East-over terrace resident, complained that sanitary conditions were extremely poor and asked the city to take action. He said he personally had no objection to the high bids.

Duff replied that the city could send out cards advising the residents concerned of the original bids to see if they would accept them. He said that meanwhile alternative recommendations would be presented at the council's March 5 meeting.

Approve Purchase - The council approved purchasing a tract north of Prune st. in line with the proposed extension of Columbus ave. for \$4,000. Duff said that approval for acquiring just the right of way through this property averaged \$3,375. For only \$625 more, he said, the city could purchase the entire property and then have four lots to sell after the extension is constructed.

Robert L. Baccus, Ward III councilman and principal of the recently-opened Wilson elementary school, asked for a directional sign to help visitors find their way to the school. Duff said such a sign could be installed.
