

Klamath Pels Lash Crater High Crew

Central Point—Pouring on the offensive power as if to retaliate for a recent close call, the Klamath Union high Pelicans dominated the conflict in every department to bounce the Crater Comets 86 to 45 in a Southern Oregon conference basketball game at Klamath Falls on Friday night.

Spurred by big Bob Peterson, the Pelicans meshed 35 field goals in 37 attempts for a sizzling .619 average. They plunked 16 of 20 for .750 at the free toss stripe.

Klamath topped 17 to 9 at the quarter and broke away from an eight-point gap of 24 to 16 lead 40 to 21 at half-time. Third quarter standing was 59 to 33.

Three Clubs Gain Berths In Tourney

UCLA left the floor trailing, 33-32, at the half, after Chuck Rask hit on a push shot to give the visitors the edge. UCLA blew an early 18-8 advantage.

But the second half was a different story as UCLA's Coach Johnny Wooden used his full bench in building up a commanding lead.

San Antonio, Tex. — (UPI)—Tommy Jacobs, 24-year-old Whittier, Calif., pro, grabbed a one-stroke lead in the \$20,000 Texas Open golf tournament Saturday with a 6-under-par 32-33-65 for a 54-hole total of 207.

Defending champion B'ill Johnston of Provo, Utah, toured the 6,490-yard, par 36-35-71 Brackenridge park layout in 36-34-70 to move into sole possession of second place with 208.

Four golfers, including first round leader Wes Ellis Jr. of Aldecress, N.J., were tied at 209. Ellis, who fell from the lead Friday with a 71, put together a 37-35-72 Saturday.

Mike Souchak, 1955 Texas Open winner from Grossinger, N.Y., tied for fourth place after the second round with a 138 total, came in with a 71. Also sharing the tie were Al Balding of Markham, Ont., and Tom Niepote of Bronxville, N.Y. Balding shot a 68 Saturday and Niepote came in with a 68.

From Manhattan, Kan., managed only 37-39-76 Saturday for a 212.

Minneapolis helped eliminate New York beating the Knicks, 116-106, in the opening game of a Detroit double-header.

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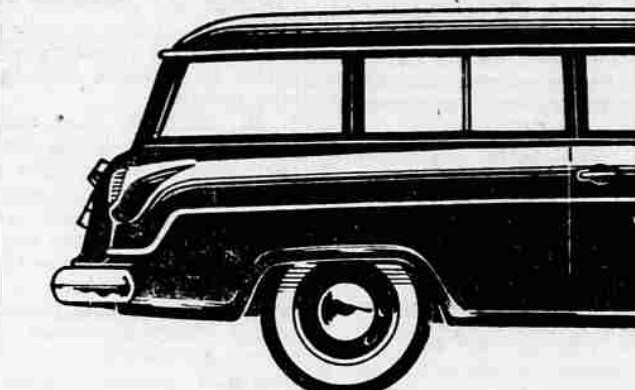
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
