Miss Frances Thrun, Medford dramatic soprano, will be soloist for the concert. She has chosen two arias for this appearance, the "Dich teure halle" from Wagner's "Tann-

hauser" and "Voi la sapete" from Mascagni's "Cavalleria Rusticana." These numbers will provide contrast for the otherwise instrumental program. Miss Thrun has a voice of unusual beauty and is a favorite with valley audiences.

Bruno Pellegrini, associate conductor, will serve as accompanist.
