## Forest Rental Money Debated

Salem—UPI—A hearing was held here Monday on House bill 205 which provides that at least 25 per cent of money received by counties from federal forest reserve rentals shall be used for the county road fund and another 25 per cent for the county school fund.

Opponents of the bill said 25 per cent was not enough to build access roads into uncut timber tracts.

Those in favor of the bill argued that this amount would be supplemented by county road funds.

The law presently requires that 75 per cent of the county's share from forest reserve rentals shall be used for the road fund.

The new bill, introduced by Sen. Ben Musa (D-The Dalles), Rep. Katherine Musa (D-The Dalles) and others, provides that the county court or board of commissioners may set the ratio between road and school use providing they put at least 25 per cent into roads.

The bill also eliminated the requirement that present money applied to the school fund must be used only for payment of bonded indebtedness.

F. Bragg, N.C. —UPI—General of the Army George C. Marshall, his recovery from a series of two strokes complicated by a pituitary gland condition, remained seriously ill today at the Army's Womack General Hospital.

They said the gland trouble appeared in a "definite increase in water output by way of the kidneys." The pituitary is a gland attached to the brain and secretes substances which raise and lower blood pressure.
