Boeing Jet Loses Engine During Trip Over France

London —(UPI)—A Pan American World Airways jetliner dropped an engine on a training flight between Paris and London today but made a safe landing at London airport.

The big four-engine Boeing 707, a type put into transatlantic service by Pan American last fall, was taxied into a hangar immediately after the landing and reporters were barred.

A Pan American spokesman said the plane was carrying six persons, a crew of five and an observer from the U.S. Civil Aeronautics authority.

The plane was reported to have dropped its No. 4, outboard, starboard engine somewhere over the Rhine area of eastern France, northeast of Paris.

A Pan American official said one of the two engines which are suspended beneath the right wing fell off in flight.

"We do not know yet what caused this to happen," he said. "We have not established exactly where it fell out. There was no danger of the engine hitting the aircraft as it would have fallen straight down. There is only a gap in the wing of about two feet where the engine fell out."

Billy Graham Urges Prayers for Leaders

Melbourne, Australia —(UPI)—American evangelist Billy Graham called on people everywhere tonight to pray for world leaders working toward peace.

"We should pray for (British Prime Minister Harold) Macmillan in Moscow and (U.S. Secretary of State John) Foster Dulles and all other world leaders," he told 25,000 persons attending his meeting in the Sydney Myer Musical Bowl.

"The world now is in peril and on the brink of a third world war, but these services in Melbourne could do something toward peace," Graham said.

About 1,000 persons came forward to make decisions for Christ at tonight's meeting.

Elizabeth Taylor Pledges \$100,000 In Israel Bonds

Beverly Hills, Calif. —(UPI)—Actress Elizabeth Taylor gave pledge to buy \$100,000 in Israel bonds at a fund-raising banquet Tuesday night and a joint pledge of \$10,000 was made in behalf of her and singer Eddie Fisher.

A total of \$1,250,000 was received from the star-studded audience in pledges to buy Israel bonds.

Abraham Feinberg, national president of the Development Corporation for Israel, caused an embarrassed titter at the plush banquet held for the sale of bonds and in honor of George Jessel's 50th year in show business when he said:

"A \$10,000 contribution was made by Eddie Cantor in behalf of Eddie Fisher and Debbie Rey — (pause) er, ah, Elizabeth Taylor."

Earlier Eddie Cantor praised Miss Taylor's contributing saying: "I'm delighted the academy has nominated Elizabeth Taylor for an Oscar as best actress of the year and not for someone who has fallen in love."

Stars present included toastmaster Jack Benny, Miss Taylor, Fisher-divorced by Debbie Reynolds because of Miss Taylor-Milton Berle, George Burns, George Montgomery, Dinah Shore, Edward G. Robinson Sr., Gov. Edmund G. Brown and Los Angeles Mayor Norris Poulson.

Washington —(UPI)—Sen. J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.) said today a fellow Democrat's attack on Lyndon B. Johnson's Senate leadership was made in "very poor grace and with very little justification."

Fulbright, chairman of the Foreign Relations committee, said he did not think the public criticism voiced by Sen. William Proxmire (D-Wis.) would produce "any great revolution" in Senate affairs.

Few Democratic liberals were willing to speak up publicly in support of Proxmire's charge that Johnson was failing to give colleagues a voice in party decisions. But Proxmire said he had received "many private expressions of support" from fellow senators who feel as he does.
