

Marshall Spends Comfortable Day

Ft. Bragg, N.C.—UPI—Ailing General of the Army George C. Marshall's condition remained "unchanged" early today and doctors said their prognosis was "still guarded."

A medical bulletin late Tuesday said that Marshall, whose recovery from two strokes and a bout with pneumonia has been complicated by a pituitary gland disorder, had spent a comfortable day.

The report said, however, the gland disorder "still constitutes a therapeutic problem."

The Medical Roundup

Many Doctors Disapprove of Football in Jr. High Schools

Of late, a number of thoughtful physicians have come out strongly against football in junior highs. They see too many serious injuries. One big reason why the boys should not play football is that their epiphyses, or growing ends of their long bones, are not yet firmly attached to the shaft of the bone. These ends can be knocked off, and this will mean the end of growth in the bone. As the lad reaches his full height the ends of the bones become firmly attached to the shafts and then one danger is over. But several dangers remain. The knee-joint is often so badly injured that it can hardly be restored to normal, even by a good orthopedist. Every so often I read in a medical journal of a boy's kidney that was torn in two in a football game.

In the American Medical Association News I read that Dr. R. A. McGuigan has convinced his school board in Evanston, Ill., that there should be no football in the first two years of high school. In Scope Weekly, I find Dr. Robert P. Watkins, clinical professor of orthopedic surgery at Stanford, also disapproving of football at any age. A knee is often so injured that when the player gets to the age of 40 or so, he may have to limp around. Many old football players suffer much from injuries to the bones of the neck, suffered when, day after day and hour after hour, with all of their 200 pounds behind them they crashed head on into another powerful man running to ward them.

As Dr. Watkins said a football player who is carried off the field badly hurt may seem to be all right in a week, but will be get off scot-free? Dr. Watkins doubts it. He says the man is likely to suffer from that injury, perhaps 20 or 30 years later.

Dr. Harold (Brick) Muller who, years ago, was an All-American end, is still in favor of football, but he is quoted as saying that at one time or another, he broke his jaw, nose, left leg, ankle and a rib! Dr. Muller is against a lad's playing football after he has damaged or weakened a knee.

Electrolysis for Removal of Hair

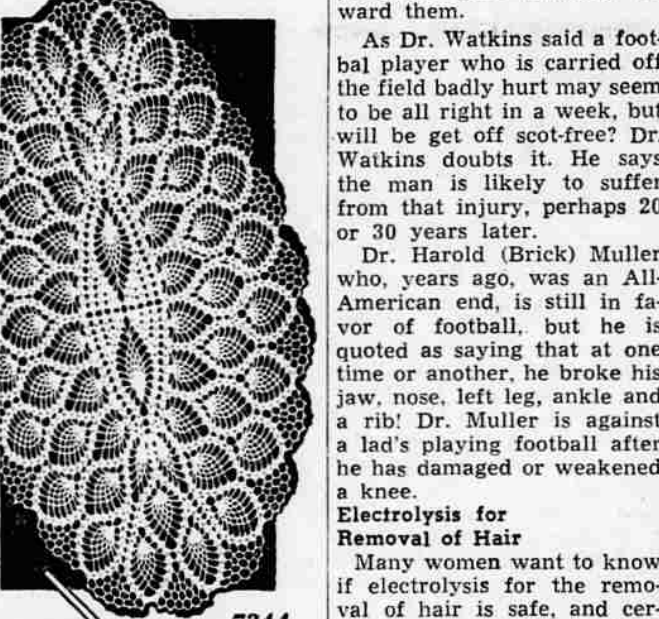

I imagine I would do as so many women in moderate circumstances do today, and would use an ordinary safety razor. Some women use a cream which contains a drug which removes the hair, but it cannot be expected to keep it from growing again.
