

Disk Jockey Hospitalized

Bakersfield - (UPI) - Disk Jockey Jim Stokes, 29, was reported hospitalized in a state of complete exhaustion today after staying awake for 226 hours and 34 minutes.

Stokes ended his wake-a-thon Wednesday at 7:55 p.m. when he folded up while broadcasting from a store window. His wife, Gail, was sitting next to him, and he fell into her arms.

Stokes, father of four children, claimed a new record in the marathon effort, but he may run into an argument from Don Tucker, Wallace, N. C. (230 hours), and possibly from Dave Hunner, Jackson, Miss (225 hours). He said he was out to beat the mark set by New York Disk Jockey

Argentina in Throes To Peron's Policies; People Restless of Inflation Due

Suppose as a resident of the United States the cost of your gasoline suddenly rose to a dollar a gallon, bread to 40 or 50 cents a loaf, beef to two dollars a pound and almost everything else proportionately.

It has happened in Argentina and the people are beginning to complain despite the best efforts of President Arturo Frondizi to convince them it is for their own good.

Even the businessmen, his most ardent supporters, are protesting.

Under dictator Juan D. Peron, Argentina was bled nearly dry.

Eva, bought popularity by using the nation's capital reserves to the backbone of any country's economy - to boost wages to unprecedented highs without increasing production.

Trade Imbalance Occurred
Peron sacrificed agriculture to grandiose plans for industrializing Argentina.

The once-profitable meat, wheat and wool exports could not keep the money coming in fast enough to pay for imports. This is known as a trade imbalance and if it keeps up long enough a country will

go broke.
Watching his reserves drop, Peron confiscated private industries. Foreign investors took their money elsewhere. More loss of currency.

For 2 1/2 years the provisional governments had been unable to reverse the downward trend of the economy.

Sought Aid
Frondizi, an expert economist, first of all disassociated himself from the Communists and Peronists who voted for him, insisting he did not seek their help. Then he looked to the north for aid.

He got \$329 million worth from the United States, but he did not rely solely on this. Convinced the main effort would have to be made by

Argentina itself, he released artificial controls over the peseta and left it to seek its true value on the world market.

Frondizi told his people it would mean sacrifices, and it has. Prices on everything have skyrocketed with the dropping of the peseta's value.

SNOW IN PEIPING
Tokyo - (UPI) - The New China Agency said today Peiping was covered with more than 10 inches of snow Wednesday in the heaviest snowfall in 80 years.

Frondizi is taking a calculated risk that the new rate will be so attractive to foreigners that exports will zoom and the income more than make up for inflation.

He has launched two other campaigns to improve the Argentine economy: Try to attract more government and private capital from the United States (which he did on his just-completed trip) and create regional market areas for Latin America.

Frondizi predicts his plans will begin to bear fruit for the Argentine people in two

years. The question is: Will they wait that long?

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Parents Should Regain Control Of Children, Sam Levenson Says

Editor's note: Recently in a series of guest appearances with Arthur Godfrey on CBS-TV, folk humorist Sam Levenson made some unusually outspoken comments on the moral laxity of today's teenagers. Levenson, a former teacher and a parent himself, has made a successful career of poking good-natured fun at family life in general and the foibles of children in particular. But in the following dispatch he is dead serious as he tells what he thinks is wrong with the present-day teen-ager-parent relationship.

I don't deny kids pleasure. God bless them. I want them all to have fun. But I also hate to see them getting killed or seduced in cars and getting into all kinds of trouble. And the statistics are that they do get into a lot of trouble.

What to do about it? The parents have got to have the guts to be parents. It takes a little courage to face up to a kid when you know he is wrong. Our own parents had rules and regulations for us. I don't say they were always right. But there were rules, simple rules, and we knew what they were and most of the time we followed them—or else.

You either went to school and did a good job or you went to work. If you went to college you waited to get married at least until you were out. If you wanted a car or a raccoon coat or whatever—I'm not talking about rich kids, but average kids or average families—you worked to get the money for it. Sometimes you could make enough, sometimes you couldn't.

Must Have Car
Now, the kid starts with a car which is given him for no good reason except he wants it and "all the other fellows have one." He can't go out on a Saturday night unless there's a car. There's a bus that passes his house a block or two away, but he won't take it. He must have the car.

The trouble with today's teenagers is they expect everything in life free. We've tried to make our kids happy by giving them everything that we didn't have in life. It doesn't work out. You do a kid no good by giving to him. Because the only thing he gets out of life that way is the habit of receiving. You've denied him the joy of achieving.

Does anybody say to a kid any more, "You're off Saturday. You've nothing to do. How about working for that extra five bucks you want?" He never heard of it. He gets panicky. That's when to lay down some of the rules. One of the biggest is that a youngster must be taught to be self-sufficient. He has to start growing up.

Marry Some Idiot
And going steady—at 15!

First thing you know—they

don't know a thing yet except how to neck or rock 'n' roll—they walk in with some idiot and say, "Ma, we're going to get married." And Ma says yes because maybe the kid'll walk in next week with an even worse idiot. Then the parents are supporting the kids through the first babies, or through college, or both. In the old days, you remember, mother and father made the arrangements. They met the girl—or the boy. They met the family. And they investigated—practically the FBI, fingerprints, everything.

Industry Due At McNary Site
Pendleton - (UPI) - A new industry for the eastern Oregon area was launched at the McNary townsite 40 miles west of here Wednesday when William H. Schultz, president of S and S Steel Products, Inc., Los Angeles accepted the deed for the 340 acre property in brief ceremonies.

Schultz, representing the house trailer manufacturing firm headed by him and his brother, Robert, accepted the deed from Elias J. Quampts, chairman of the Umatilla Indian Board of Trustees.

Schultz said the company expected to begin manufacturing mobile house units within six weeks.

The townsite was constructed as a government project at a cost of some \$3,750,000 to provide housing and business space for the construction of McNary dam on the Columbia river.

Schultz said employment will be offered to Indians of the Confederated Umatilla tribes. About 150 persons will be employed. Schultz said, however, that he will try to bring in allied industries which will raise the employment figure.

It's up to the parents. Who else is going to protect the young? The tiger does it for his cubs. We'd better find out where we stand in this world, find out our values in this society. The teenagers need a reason for living, too. They need a devotion. They need something that's better and more important than the car. The kids are confused because the whole code of values is upset. A child must be raised with a sense of responsibility to himself, to his parents, to his country.

The parents of America are frightened, they're more frightened than the kids. Actually the ruling class in America today are the teenagers. They have laid the rules out. It's time the parents took the rules back in their own hands.

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
