Susie Raebel and two young friends were attacked by a female German shepherd and her two full-size puppies Tuesday while playing on the street in front of her Los Angeles home.

The dogs escaped from a wired pen across the street and charged the three children, nipping the leg of one of the youths and then ganging up on Susie when her companions fled in terror.

Doctors at Washington hospital said Susie would recover without any permanent injury.

The three dogs, pets of Mrs. John E. Archibald, a nurse who was not at home at the time of their escape, will be destroyed by the city after a 14-day routine check for possible rabies.

Certification for Tree Seeds Seen in Future of Forestry

Corvallis—Tree seed certification and marketing standards similar to those for agricultural seeds are predicted for the future in forestry by an Oregon State college seed expert.

Until 10 years ago, little attention had been paid to the standards of quality of forest seeds, Mrs. Louisa Jensen of the OSC seed laboratory points out. Today, forest seed testing and quality control are among the promising new developments in forestry.

The value of tree seeds planted annually in the Northwest now runs around \$1,000,000 because of increased seed plantings by air. This has helped put greater emphasis on seed quality.

Research on storage of tree seeds is also being emphasized by forest research workers because a good seed crop comes about only every four to seven years in the Northwest for several important kinds of trees. Last good seed year in the Northwest was 1956.

Below Freezing

Tree seeds are generally stored at below freezing temperatures at present but much still needs to be known on effects of temperature and moisture content on storage life; on problems of handling and shipping; and on best containers for seed storage.

The OSC seed laboratory now is testing about as many tree seeds each year as any laboratory in the country. Testing involves checks for

St. Louis Union Asks Pension Plan

St. Louis, Mo. — (UPI) — Richard H. Amberg, publisher of the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, announced a new pension proposal by the striking St. Louis Newspaper Guild.

The proposal was contained in an open letter to the publisher from Rollin Everett, executive secretary of the Guild, which has been on strike against the newspaper since Saturday morning.

"If you will offer us a pension plan identical in details to the Pulitzer St. Louis Post-Dispatch plan, including the company's disability pension practice, we will recommend to our membership acceptance of it," Everett's letter said.

Amberg earlier rejected a revised pension proposal submitted by the Guild Monday. He said it was "no more feasible or possible" than previous proposals.
