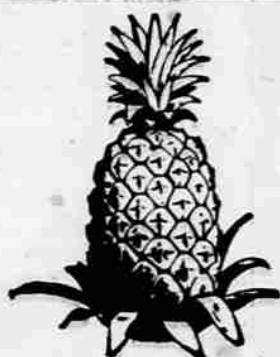

Little Spaniel Leads Strange and Unusual Life
Prince leads a strange and unusual life for a dog. He lives on the ninth floor of an apartment building, located right in the heart of a large city.

His master is chained to a wheelchair and seldom leaves his ninth floor apartment. With him Prince leads a dedicated life, under which most dogs would have become psychologically unbalanced in a year's time. But Prince has philosophically accepted this way of life and is now, after six years, pretty well adjusted.

Every morning at 9, the apartment door of 917 opens and Prince trots forth. His home is about 60 feet from the elevator. He never looks to the right or to the left as he proceeds down the hall to the elevator. Occasionally some one who knows the dog will speak kindly or reach down and pat his head. But he never tarries. As soon as the "good morning" salutations are over he proceeds to the elevator.

All the elevator operators know the dog and when to expect him, and if at all possible, they will wait. As the door opens the dog gives the operator a "thank you" look then goes to the back of the cab. If anyone gets on, on the way down, the dog allows them to enter or leave first. There is no spoken word. The elevator operator takes Prince to the basement level. He never has to tell the dog, "This is your floor, sir." The dog always knows. As the door opens Prince proceeds down the hall to the outside door. Usually it is open. If not, Prince waits for a human to do the pushing for him.

Once outside Prince surveys the little hotel park, then rolls on the soft grass, twisting and turning, getting the kinks out of his body. Then a short run to the outdoor pool. He watches, with silent fascination, the goldfish. Then over to the iron fence where he peeks through the bars as the traffic streams past. This occupies him for a half hour.

His outing over, the little spaniel goes back to the hotel, enters the outer door and waits for the elevator.

Sometimes the elevator operator tries to fool the dog by stopping at other floors but by some unknown sense he knows his floor.

Arriving at his own door he taps the door, once only. The door opens and the little dog disappears not to be seen again until 4 p.m., when the entire proceeding is again enacted.

This nine floor vertical migration has been going on for six years. Prince is an unusual dog, living a peculiar life. He knows no other way. People, elevators, a few hours each day in a tiny patch of outdoors is his life. Environment has pulled in his horizons to within a few inches of his cold, little nose.

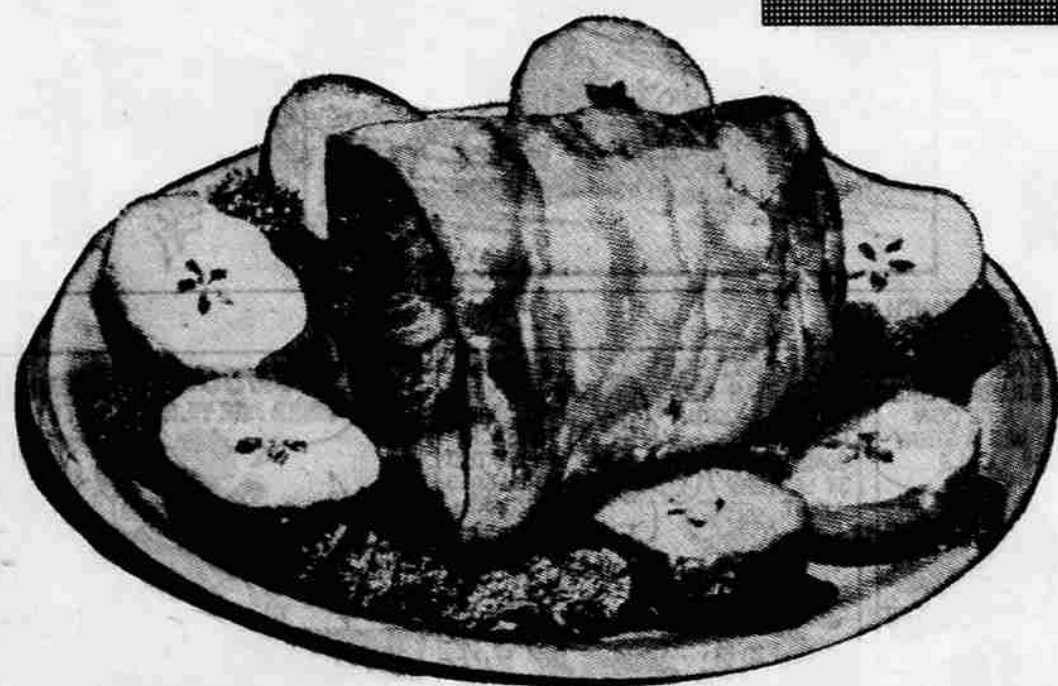
