Dirksen Urges Congressmen To Stop Debating World Problems

Washington—(UPI)—Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen (Ill.) suggested in effect today that his colleagues stop talking so much about Berlin and other world trouble spots.

Dirksen told reporters it was dangerous for senators to reach conclusions on foreign policy matters "unless they had every available fact." Senate debates, he said, can make headlines around the world.

He also said Congress should not try to "prejudice the administration in any way" by passing resolutions on the Berlin or other international crises.

Dirksen's remarks appeared aimed at a full-scale Senate debate on the Berlin situation Thursday in which Democratic Whip Mike Mansfield (Mont.) urged the United States and its allies to take the "initiative for peace" in an all-out effort to head off war.

The GOP leader also seemed to be opposing a "unity" resolution by Sen. Thomas J. Dodd (D-Conn.) Dodd called for a 90-day "crash program" to alert Americans to the dangers they face in the Berlin showdown.

SOC Alumni Group Presents Pictures

Ashland—Southern Oregon College Alumni association members have presented the college with 34 early-day photographs of Ashland, the Old Academy, and the Southern Oregon Normal school, Hugh G. Simpson, director of alumni affairs, has announced.

Framed in black hardwood, the pictures have been enlarged in such a manner as to eliminate many of the defects caused by age and handling. Each photograph has been mounted on white matting material and permanently protected by glass.

According to Simpson, the project has been underway for nearly three years, the last two of which were under the direction of Mrs. Anna Beeson Carter, historian for the Old Timers branch of the SOC alumni association. The Old Timers is composed of all those who attended before 1910 when the college was discontinued by the legislature until its re-establishment in 1926 on its present site.

Special praise was given to alumni members, Mrs. Alice

Franch Willis, secretary of the Old Timers; Alice Applegate Peil, former supervisor of the old training school; and to Adele Sheldon, secretary of the regular SOC alumni association; for their work with Mrs. Carter in assembling the collection.

Framing, Matting Pictures
Framing and matting of the pictures was done by H. E. Skidmore of the Skidmore Picture Gallery, Medford. Design and lettering of titles and names was by Bill McCorkle, Medford commercial artist; and photographic work by Fred G. Hall, formerly of Ashland, and now proprietor of Hall's Photo Studio, Medford.

Pictures include views of the Old Chatauqua building where the original Shakespearean Festival stage was erected and where the new theatre is being built; downtown Ashland, including views of the Plaza with teams of horses tied to the hitching posts in front of the stores; an early-day Ashland high school graduation class; a athletic teams; classroom scenes; and other fascinating glimpses of the life and times during the period, of particular interest during the Centennial year.

Those wishing to view the historic photographs now being placed on exhibit in the Carpenter room of the Britt Student Center, will be allowed to do so in about two weeks. A formal presentation of the pictures will take place

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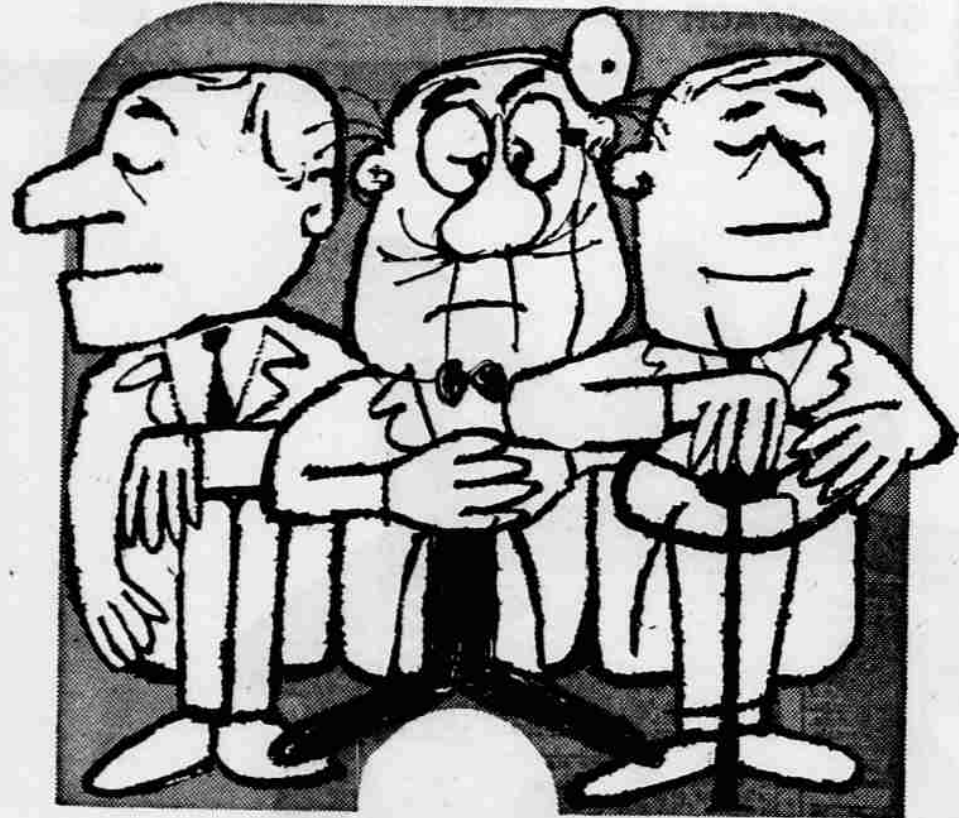
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DOVE OF PEACE
