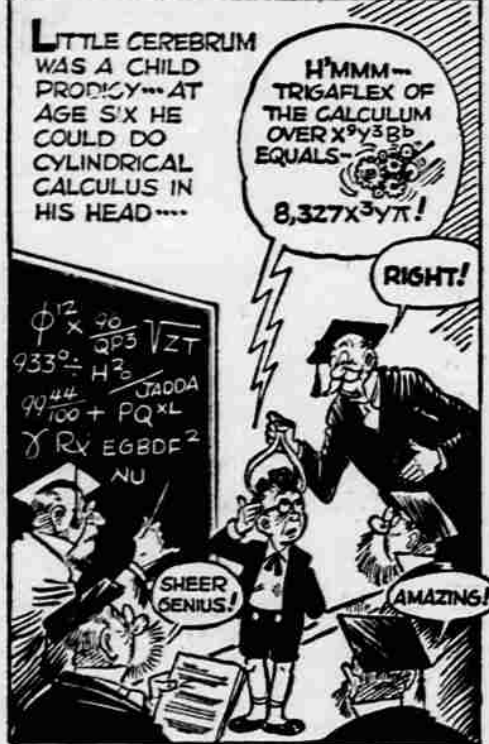

Last Rites Held For Racketeer

Newark, N.J. —UP— Funeral services were scheduled today for Abner (Longie) Zwillman, a slum-bred racketeer who craved respectability.

He will best be remembered as perhaps the last of the bootleg barons. The racketeers' long-time friends and associates paid their last respects Thursday night while Zwillman's body was on view at a funeral home. A crowd of about 150, mostly men, filed before the open casket of the man labeled by the FBI as the "leader of the New Jersey underworld."

Zwillman's step-son John Steinbach, said the former bootlegger had been "depressed and worried" by an FBI investigation into charges that a jury which failed to convict him of income tax evasion in 1956 had been fixed.

Back Stairs: Ike's Change in Plans

Washington—UPI—Backstairs at the White House:

It may have helped American-Mexican relations more than a little when President Eisenhower decided to pass up a golfing weekend at Augusta, Ga., immediately following his visit to Acapulco, Mexico.

Mexicans are highly sensitive and proud people. Among their sources of pride is Acapulco with its sparkling white bay, glistening white beaches and 90-degree days of sunshine in mid-winter.

Some of the people around President Adolfo Lopez Mateos could not get through their heads why Eisenhower knowingly would leave what they regard as the finest resort in the world to go to another resort—and the very next day, too.

Talk along these lines be-

gan to filter back to the White House party even as the President's Air Force aide, Col. William G. Draper, was getting frequent weather reports from Georgia.

Filed Flight Plan

Even though the White House continued to say that a stop at Augusta was a possibility, Draper quietly filed a flight plan for the Columbine III from Acapulco direct to Washington. At the same time, press secretary Jim Hagerty began to advise Washington reporters in Acapulco that chances for a stop in Georgia were diminishing.

Against this background, the Columbine checked on the weather while over Louisiana during the northern flight home and a decision was reached rather quickly that a stop in Georgia was out completely.

One official of the United States Embassy in Mexico City told United Press International:

"Lopez Mateos and Eisenhower got along famously and I'm sure the Mexican President understood thoroughly why Eisenhower wanted a weekend of rest in Georgia. Lopez Mateos also understood why Eisenhower would not prolong his visit to Acapulco because of a previously announced schedule and the fact it would tie up literally hundreds of Mexican officials for that additional time."

"But from our viewpoint, it would have been so much better if even the off-chance that Eisenhower might go from Acapulco to Augusta had never been disclosed."

"I know a million reasons against it, but what a tremendous hit it would have made with the Mexicans if Eisenhower had just said, 'like this Mexican weather so much that I want to stay an extra day.'"

Secret Service Happy
No one could have been happier about the brevity of the Acapulco visit, however, than the U.S. Secret Service.

FREEDOM OF THOUGHT

Baghdad, Iraq—UPI—Premier Abdul Karim el-Kassem told a meeting of Iraqi teachers Thursday that the aim of his revolutionary government is to "give the people complete freedom of thought and action."

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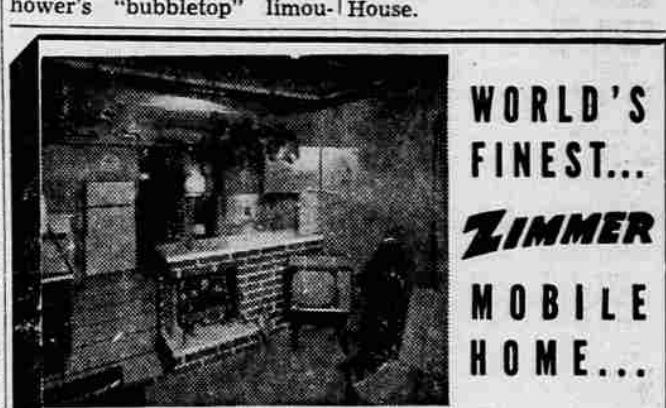
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The American agents had to improvise rapidly. They put Eisenhower into their big open "follow up" touring car and set out through the howling crowds along the streets. The agents ran alongside the car, but as the speed picked up, they had nowhere to go. Normally they would have leaped on the follow-up car. So-five agents had to jump on the back bumper of the car bearing Eisenhower and cling for their lives as the procession negotiated the 15 miles of winding mountain roads at 50 to 60 miles an hour to the temporary White House.



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
