

## Works of Student Artists Chosen for National Show

Works of four Medford High school art students will compete on a national basis in the National Scholastic Arts showing in Pennsylvania in May. The works of these students were among those that received regional awards at the 1959 Oregon annual scholastic art exhibition of junior and senior art work at the J. K. Gill ccpany, Portland, last month.

The students are Kent Sherry, who received five first place and one exhibit awards; DeWanda Winchell, two firsts and two exhibit awards; Dick Day, two firsts and one exhibit award; and Judy Wymore, one first place award. The highest number of Med-

ford High school art students to have their work selected for national recognition in one year prior to this time was three. Last year Miss Winchell was the only local student to have work selected for national competition. She received second place on a national level in block printing.

These four students and Linda Harnsberger, who received a regional first place award, received gold keys. Exhibits awards were also received by Dave Havlick, Barbara Marshall, Janice Butts, Jack Howard and Dean Welch.

Warren Wolf, art instructor, reported that the 32 Medford High school entries in 15 media received 20 awards at the show.

The advanced classes of the art department toured the Portland showing and also reviewed the exhibition of the works of Vincent van Gogh at the Portland Art Museum.

The 17 Medford students and chaperones were accompanied by four art students from Crater High school on a special tour of the van Gogh showing February 20.

In addition to the van Gogh exhibition, the students toured numerous art shops in Portland showing and also toured the art school at the University of Oregon and the Murray-Warner Museum of Oriental art.
