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### Butte Falls Grange Dinner Commemorates Centennial

Butte Falls - Oregon's Centennial year was commemorated at a dinner given February 21 by Butte Falls Grange. Guests came from Shady Cove, Ashland, Medford and Central Point as well as from Butte Falls, bringing the attendance to more than 125 persons.

Tables were decorated in the Centennial theme and the stage front with log cabins and a miniature forest. All food, even to home-made bread and butter, were dishes that might have been served by our grandmothers 100 years ago.

While guests were still seated at the table, Ernest Smith, an old-time resident, gave a historical resume of the pioneer settlers in the Butte Falls territory. Many descendants of these families were present and many live here.

Augustus (Gus) Edmondson, who was born in Butte Falls in 1890, was honored as the oldest pioneer resident and presented a boutonniere. Others present were his brother Robert Edmondson, Edward Cook, Ernest Smith and Mrs. Ben Edmondson, who was presented a corsage for being the eldest woman present. The corsage and boutonniere were made of red carnations, typifying the courage of our forefathers.

Mrs. Della Littlefield, lecturer of Shady Cove Grange, read excerpts from Jackson County Grange meeting minutes held in the year 1874. One item of interest noted that the committee on beef reported that they had made the necessary arrangements to supply beef to patrons on the following terms: The butcher to be furnished with beef on foot at 3 cents per pound, and he to deliver beef at the door for 6 cents; patrons receiving beef to have the privilege of paying for it with beef cattle. Another item showed that a motion was made and passed that the price of grain be set at one cent per pound and flour \$18 per thousand as the lowest price to be taken by patrons in cash or to pay debts.

The school band, led by Leslie Boggan played four numbers. Parents and friends were greatly impressed by the progress made, as this group was newly organized from untrained musicians last fall.

Stunts, parlor games and old time dances, such as the Virginia reel and square dances filled the evening's entertainment.

Most Grange members and many guests were dressed in Centennial costumes. Some of the clothing articles were authentic heirlooms.
