## Rocket Group Gives Market Real Whirl

New York —UPI— The stock market hitched its star to a rocket today.

Investors gave the missile-rocket group a real whirl today, with some of the companies involved scoring sensational gains.

Some profit taking hit the market before the close, paring gains in some groups. The best gains were scored by stocks outside the group used in compiling the averages, which did not reflect the true strength of the market.

Some of the rocket fuel issues had a real field day. Thiokol ran up around seven points at its high and Stauffer Chemical and Gulf were up more than four each. American Potash rose more than three.

Electronics issues also met strong support. Zenith rose six, Hoffman Electronic around four and Sylvania three. The aircraft manufacturers, most of which also make missiles and rockets, showed numerous gains of a point or more.

## Some Americans Visit Red China Despite U. S. Ban

Tokyo —UPI— Some Americans are visiting Communist China despite the strict U. S. State Department order against such visits.

These visits are being made almost unnoticed outside of the "Bamboo Curtain" but with much fanfare on the China mainland.

And these visits come in spite of the fact that there are Americans still held prisoner by the Communist government in Peiping.

### Red Carpet Treatment

The latest Americans receiving red carpet treatment by the Chinese are prominent American Negro scholar and educator Dr. William F. B. Du Bois and his wife, Shirley Graham, who married Du Bois in 1951.

Du Bois and his wife, both of whom are members of the World Peace Council, have been meeting the top Communist Chinese leaders since they arrived in Communist China earlier this month.

Last Tuesday Du Bois was feted on his 91st birthday with Chinese Communist Foreign Minister Chen Yi acting as sort of master of ceremonies at a large banquet in Peiping.

Earlier during his visit Du Bois and his wife were received by Premier Chou En Lai.

### Another Visitor

Another American believed to be in China is Frank Coe, who was one time prominent as secretary of the International Monetary Fund and an official of the U. S. Treasury Department.

A third one-time prominent American is writer and journalist Anna Louise Strong, who now calls Peiping her home.

A contrast to the wide publicity and newspaper headlines given when other Americans visited Red China in defiance to the State Department ban, these people have gone so quietly that few knew they were there until their presence was reported by the Communist press or radio.

### No Explanation

Coe's presence in Peiping was not reported until an article under his by-line appeared in the January issue of the China Welfare Institute's English-language magazine "China Reconstructs."

U. S. diplomats had no explanation now how or when he reached the China mainland and are not sure today if he is still there.

Writer Strong's continued presence in Peiping — she is believed to have been in the Chinese capital now for some time — was made known in the March issue of the same magazine which reached Tokyo last week end.

## President of Local Firm Transferred

Victor E. Newman, secretary-treasurer of the Handicapped Industries, Inc., will be in charge of the local facilities, it was reported today in the absence of the president, Eric A. Allen.

Allen, who organized the firm in the valley on West Jackson st., has been transferred to Eugene by the toy firm by which he is employed. It was reported that he will continue as president of the Handicapped Industries here, making trips to the valley as deemed necessary.

The local firm assembled toys at its headquarters prior to Christmas last year. The office is now temporarily closed. Newman said that plans are currently underway for additional financial backing so operations may start again in the near future.

In addition to Allen and Newman, other board members include John Duffy, vice-president, and Mrs. Allen.

## Portland Diplomat Sees 'War' Cause

Portland —UPI— Sheldon T. Mills, career diplomat from Portland recently appointed U.S. ambassador to Jordan, said here Sunday a "revolution in expectation" led to the current economic war over underdeveloped and uncommitted nations between the Free World and Communism.

Mills, for the past three years U. S. ambassador to Afghanistan, said "The economic front is extremely important in the underdeveloped countries. There has been a revolution in expectations of people in many countries due to communications with the outside world."

"This has not affected the rural masses, but has affected the urban dwellers, who want a better life too, and are looking around to see how they can get it." He warned that if such nations become convinced they cannot develop themselves economically and socially by other means, "Communism will have a great appeal to them."

## Eric Blore, Film, Stage Veteran Dies

Hollywood —UPI— Eric Blore, 71, a "gentleman's gentleman" on the stage and in films for half a century died of a heart attack Sunday night at the Motion Picture Country hospital.

Blore was taken to the hospital from his home here. He had been ill since suffering a stroke in 1956. He is survived by his widow, Clara, a son, Eric Jr., and a sister, Gladys Hedley of Surrey, England.

A veteran of many Fred Astaire movies in which he played a butler, Blore had top movie roles in such films as "Top Hat," "Flying Down to Rio," "Fancy Pants," "Winter Wonderland," "Abie's Irish Rose" and "Love Happy."

Born in London Dec. 23, 1887, Blore came to Hollywood in 1934. Prior to that he had starred in stage productions in New York and London.

## Senate To Limit Debate on Bills Starting Tuesday

Salem —UPI— Limitation of debate in the Senate will become effective Tuesday, Senate President Walter Pearson said today.

Under the rule, after the 50th day the author of a bill or the chairman of a committee considering the bill on final passage may speak for 10 minutes and other members five minutes on bills.

The member closing the debate on the bill may speak for 10 minutes.

Any member of the Senate may yield his allotted time in favor of any other member except that additional time may not be yielded to the member closing the debate.

### Can Save Time

On all debatable questions no member will be permitted to speak for more than five minutes.

Pearson said that by invoking the rule much time can be saved in consideration of the daily senate calendar. On controversial bills, there will be some lengthy speeches through the yielding of time by members to the senator speaking. However, once a senator yields his allotted time he forfeits his right to speak, thus cutting down the time a bill is debated.

Stamford, Conn. —UPI— Funeral services will be held in New York Tuesday for Pulitzer prize winning playwright Maxwell Anderson, 70, who died in a hospital here after suffering a stroke.
