

Kansas State Wildcats Take Over Top Rating

The Kansas State Wildcats have taken over the top spot in the United Press International major college basketball ratings.

Kansas State, which was second last week, collected 16 first-place votes and a total of 305 points. Last week's lead-

er—Kentucky—dropped to second on 11 first-place votes and 297 points. Cincinnati stayed in third with five first-place votes and 259 points while Michigan State advanced from sixth to fourth by getting two first-place votes and 214 points. North Carolina dropped from fourth

to fifth with one first-place vote and 205 points. Mississippi State, seventh last week, moved into sixth place with 128 points but North Carolina State fell from fifth to seventh on 115 points. California advanced from ninth to eighth on 92 points. Bradley jumped from 10th to 11th with 64 points after being eighth last week.

West Virginia held down 11th with 43 points followed by St. Louis in 12th with 36 points. Next were Texas Christian in 13th with 35 points, Utah in 14th with 16 points, Marquette in 15th with 15 points; St. Mary's of California in 16th with nine points; and St. John's of New York in 17th with four points. St. Bonaventure, Louisville and Oklahoma City were tied for 18th with three points each.

Nino Valdes Favored in Ring Bout

New York—(UPI)—Giant heavyweights at Miami Beach Wednesday and rugged welterweights at New York Friday will command the most attention on this week's boxing schedule.

Nino Valdes of Cuba, second-ranking heavyweight contender, meets unrated Charlie Powell of San Diego, Calif., in a 10-rounder at the Miami Beach auditorium, Wednesday night.

Friday night's 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden brings together Mexican Gaspar Ortega, sixth-ranking welterweight contender, and unrated Stefan Redl of Germany and Passaic, N.J. It will be televised and broadcast by NBC.

In the Valdes-Powell bout at Miami Beach, each fighter stands six feet three and weighs more than 200 pounds. Also each is a good puncher. Valdes, 34, is favored at 3-1 because of his ranking and his greater experience against "pamper" fighters.

Big Nino, seeking his seventh straight victory, has a 47-15-2 record that includes 33 knockouts. He was stopped three times. Powell, 26, and trying for his sixth straight win, has a 19-3-2 let that includes 14 kayoes. He was stopped in all three of his defeats.

James Ostendarp was appointed to a three-year term to succeed John McLaughry, who resigned last month to become head coach at Brown. Ostendarp has been defensive coach for the past two seasons at Cornell and formerly served as assistant football coach at Bucknell and Williams.

United States citizens have picked up only one first place in the various skating and skiing events now being held at Squaw Valley, California. New York City—(UPI)—Cincinnati's "Big Oh"—Oscar Robertson—leads the United Press International all-American College Basketball team.

Robertson—who has a 33-point-six scoring average—was named on more than 97 per cent of the 290 ballots received from sports writers and sportscasters across the country. It was the highest percentage of votes ever received by one player in the United Press International poll.

Vandals Nip U. of O. By 64-58

Eugene—(UPI)—The Idaho Vandals depressed the fans at McArthur court in Eugene Monday who came to watch Oregon play its last home basketball game of the Pacific Coast conference. The Vandals beat the Webfoots, 64 to 58.

Idaho shot 441 with John Liveious leading the way with 18 points. He tied for high honors with Oregon's Denny Strickland.

After seven ties and three changes of lead in the first 12 minutes of play, Idaho went on a nine-point scoring spree and at the intermission led 31-25. The Vandals continued to lead after the half and Oregon, in a rally paced by Strickland, Stu Robertson and Bud Kuykendall, shaved the margin to one point, 59-58 with 49 seconds remaining. But B. J. Schaffer moved out for a layin, was fouled, and sunk a free throw to ice Idaho's win.

The Ducks played without Dale Herron, who suffered a sprained ankle against UCLA Saturday night.

OSC Cager Mentioned

New York—(UPI)—Only one player from the state of Oregon—Lee Harman of Oregon State—rated honorable mention today on the 1959 United Press International all-American college basketball team.

No player from the West Coast made the first two teams but three were picked on the third team—Charlie Brown of Seattle, Doug Smart of Washington and Walt Torrence of UCLA.

Other Northwest players getting honorable mention included Frank Burgess of Gonzaga, Don Ogorek of Seattle and Bruno Boik of Washington. Also picked on the honorable mention list were Mike Moran of Marquette, who is from Eugene, Ore., and Bob Beckel of the Air Force Academy, whose home is in Walla Walla.

Angler Access Object of Bill

Salem—(UPI)—State Reps. Vernon Cook (D-Troutdale) and Bill Bradley (D-Gresham) Monday introduced a bill designed to increase the accessibility of lakes, rivers and streams for Oregon fishermen.

The bill requires all state agencies to permit use of state owned land for angling by the general public, subject to reasonable rules and regulations.

It also gives the game commission the first right of purchase of all state owned lands where a state agency intends to dispose of property at lakes, rivers and streams.

Angling fees would be increased 25 per cent with the money earmarked for gaining access and rights of way along lakes, rivers and streams.

The new fees would raise about \$350,000 a year for the acquisition program.

Oregon Frosh Remain Unbeaten

Eugene—(UPI)—The Oregon Frosh closed out an unbeaten 14-game basketball season Monday night with a 78-71 victory over McKay's Mar-kets of Eugene.

Glen Moore led the Frosh with 23 points.

Cage Schedule Set For Idaho

Moscow, Idaho—(UPI)—The University of Idaho and University of Portland will play a two-game home-and-home basketball series next season, it was announced here today. The Vandals will meet the Pilots at Portland next Dec. 12 and Portland will go to Moscow March 2, 1960.

New York—(UPI)—The National Invitation Basketball tournament in New York City has added a ninth team to its field. Butler University of Indiana today accepted an invitation to play in the tournament starting March 12th. Butler has won 18 games and lost eight and took the Indiana collegiate conference title. It will be Butler's second appearance in the NIT. Butler bowed to St. John's of New York in the first round last year. Previously entered in the tourney were Oklahoma City, Providence, Villanova, St. Bonaventure, Fordham, Manhattan, St. John's of New York and New York university.
