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Oregon Declared Losing Fight for New Industries

Portland—UPI—A realtor says Oregon is losing its battle to gain new industries and new jobs and the situation threatens to get worse because of action of the current session of the Oregon legislature.

Richard H. Lucke, last year's president of the Portland Realty Board, told the Northeast Portland Kiwanis club today that industrial prospects for this area, as indicated by preliminary studies, are at a low ebb.

Lucke said 6000 new jobs are needed annually to support Oregon's predicted population increase. Actual industrial employment dropped from 137,400 in 1948 to 131,000 in 1958 while population increased 15 per cent.

Playing Pattycake
He said the majority of Oregon legislators of both parties "is playing pattycake in a fantasy land all its own while just over the horizon an economic storm of terrific proportions is being generated."

He listed as among new threats to payrolls and jobs as contemplated by the Oregon Legislature measures to boost income taxes, lack of interest in eliminating the manufacturer's inventory tax, lack of real action on unemployment compensation abuses, and repeal of the law against organizational picketing.

As an employment booster, he suggested a 3 per cent retail sales tax exempting food, feed, seed, fertilizer and medicine, and modification of the income tax law.

Beer To Be Sold At Exposition Spots

Portland—UPI—Beer will be sold at the Oregon Centennial exposition grounds this summer but not at "stand up" or "carry away" food concessions.

This decision was made Tuesday by the Oregon Centennial commission which decided to bar beer from hamburger and hot dog eateries. The commission said it would grant concessions for beer sales at other outlets and for hard liquor at a restaurant operation.

Mrs. Monroe Sweetland, Milwaukee commission member, made the motion to bar beer sales at food stands. She said she was opposed to making beer available at places frequented by juveniles.

OSC Professor Gets Book Award

New York—UPI—The 10th annual National Book award has been given to Bernard Malamud, assistant professor of English at Oregon State college. The award was given for Malamud's collection of short stories entitled "The Magic Barrel."

The announcement was made at an awards dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel. The awards are sponsored by the American Book Publishers Council, The American Booksellers Association and the Book Manufacturers Institute. They carry cash prizes of \$1,000 each and scrolls.

Other winners included J. Christopher Herold for the non-fiction book "Mistress to an Age," and to Theodore Roethke for a poetry book, "Words for the Wind."

Cigarette Tax for Education Offered

Salem—UPI—Rep. Stafford Hansell (R-Athena) has introduced a bill in the House calling for a cigarette tax to be used to support education.

The cigarette tax would be five cents a pack and 20 per cents on other tobacco products. The people would have to vote on such a measure. Some \$18 million a biennium would be raised and go into the basic school fund.

Hansell said the money would aid the establishment of community colleges, the migrant labor pilot education program and education in general.

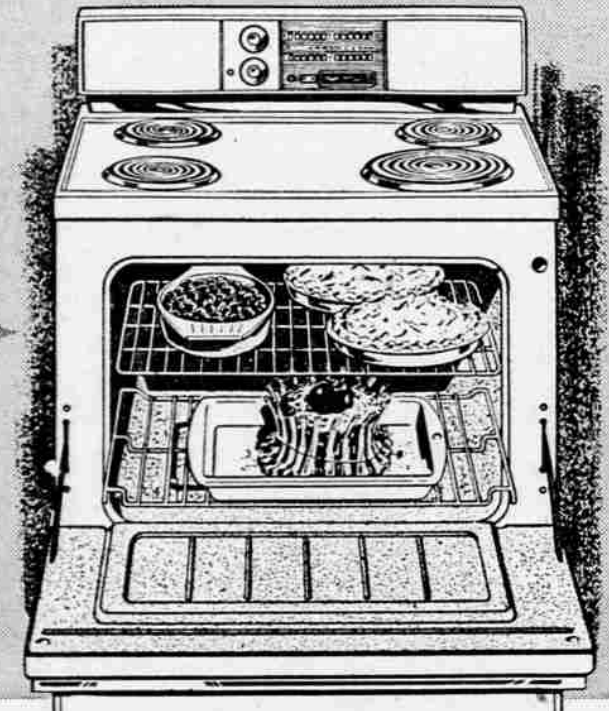
The survivors managed to scramble out of the bus windows before flames enveloped the vehicle.

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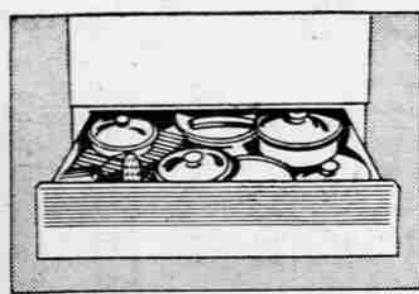
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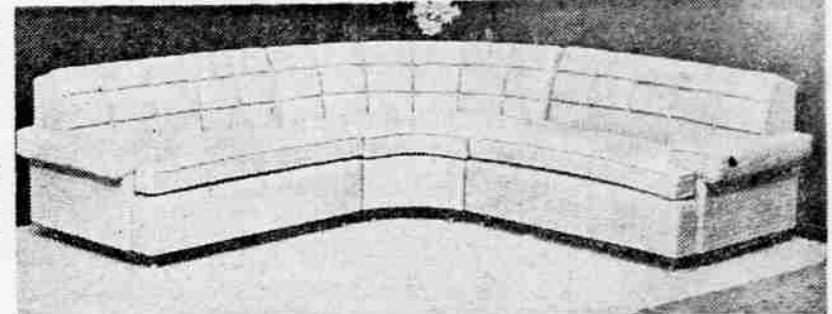
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
