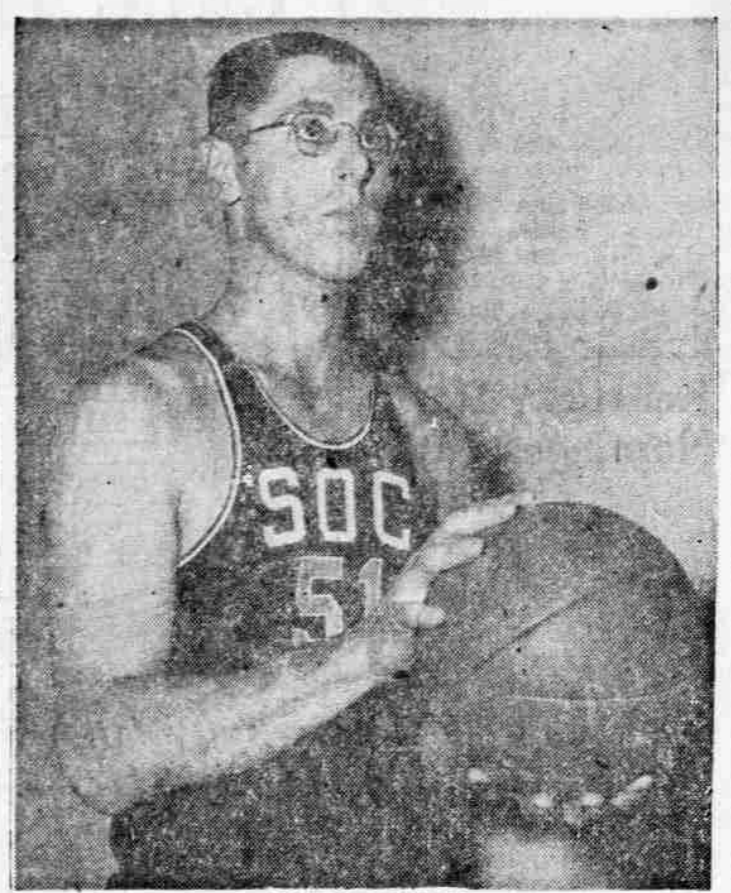


D'Olivo, Carrigan Chosen OCC Basketball All-Stars

Portland—Eastern Oregon's Larry Howard was the only unanimous choice for the 1959 all-conference basketball team chosen by coaches of the Oregon Collegiate conference. He is one of two repeat choices from last year's team. The other is Portland State's John Winters who was a first team selection in 1958 as a junior and a second team choice as a sophomore. The coaches named six players to the first team. Howard won all eight possible points in the voting and the other five tied with seven each.

Chapman Beats 'Cats

Los Angeles—(UPI)—Chapman college, ranked seventh in the United Press International small college basketball poll, walloped jittery Willamette university of Salem, Ore., 73-52, in the NCAA small college regional playoffs Friday night. Chapman, of Orange, Calif., bolted to a 15-2 lead over Willamette in the first six minutes of the contest.

Willamette actually didn't get around to scoring its first field goal for those first six minutes. When they did, it was Larry Lynn who hit the bucket to make the score 15-4, but that was about as close as the losers came.

Chapman led 42-20 at half-time and shot to a 64-37 advantage at one point in the second half.

Center Tom Cooke had 21 points to lead the winners. Buzz Wilfert had 11 points for Willamette followed by Fidel Gaviola with 10.

Fight Protest Will Be Filed

New York—(UPI)—Welterweight Stefan Redl's manager announced he will file an official protest Monday against the referee's officiating and vote in Friday night's draw-fight with Eddie Jordan, an unbeaten substitute, at Madison Square garden.

Manager Carl Duva declared: "I'll file my protest with the State Athletic commission. Referee Al Berl was prejudiced. He showed it in his actions and comments during the fight and by his vote at the finish."

Writers Disagree Sports writers at the ring-side disagreed overwhelmingly with the verdict.

In the rounds voting, referee Berl favored Jordan 6-4; but judge Artie Schwartz had Redl ahead, 7-2-1. Then judge Bill Recht scored it 4-4-2 on rounds and gave each four back-stopping points for a draw.

Manager Duva claimed referee Berl had come to Redl's corner at the end of the seventh round and told Redl, "Why don't you get out there and fight, and quit holding?" And that he had criticized Stefan several times in the ring—"although it was Redl who was making the fight."

OCC Scoring Title Won By Howard

Portland—Larry Howard, Eastern Oregon college guard, captured the Oregon Collegiate conference scoring title with a 16-game total of 280 points, a final tabulation of conference statistics revealed today. He was 10 ahead of Southern Oregon's Dave D'Olivo who led the race throughout the season until the final week of play. Howard averaged 17.5 points per game to D'Olivo's 16.8.

D'Olivo topped the field goal shooting accuracy department as well as the rebound division. The 111 field goal center scored 111 field goals in 223 attempts for a 49.7 percentage and also picked off 182 rebounds to average 11.3 per game. He was three ahead of Portland State's Bernie Jones with 179.

John Frederick of Portland State won the free throw title with an 83.9 percentage. He dropped 26 of 31 attempts. Dennis McKee of Oregon Tech was second, hitting 16 of 20, an 80.0 percentage. Howard shot .750, hitting 84 of 112 shots.

Southern Oregon was the top offensive team with a 69.3 average. Eastern Oregon was second with an average of 66.6 per game. Defensively, Portland State rated the best with a 50.6 average. Southern Oregon was second, allowing 60.1 per game.

Southern Oregon had the best team shooting percentage, .394, hitting 428 times on 1085 attempts. Eastern Oregon was second with a 37.8 percentage. The Mountaineers also captured the free throw shooting title again this year with a .649 percentage on 261 out of 402 shots. SOC followed with .611. Oregon Tech was charged with the most fouls during the campaign. The Owls were whistled 371 times. PSC had the most rebounds—761.

California Bears Claim PCC Title With Help from Bruins

By MIKE HUDSON United Press International California had the battle won today without firing a shot. The Bears backed into their third straight Pacific Coast conference basketball crown when UCLA knocked Washington out of any chance of victory with a 56-55 win Friday.

Cal (13-2) met Oregon State (7-8) last night at Berkeley, but the pressure was off since the Bruin victory over the Huskies left the Washingtonians with an 11-4 mark. Washington had only a contest with Southern California last night left on the docket. The Bears joined a select circle in notching their third consecutive title. Cal won four straight titles in the mid-1920s and Stanford, with perennial Hank Luisetti at the helm, took three straight from 1936-38. Other than that, nobody has even been able to win two consecutive titles in the past 35 years.

The battle for third spot in the loop ended in a tie with UCLA and Stanford earning 10-6 records. Stanford stayed even with the Bruins by defeating Oregon State 70-54. One other PCC contest dropped Idaho dropped Oregon 81-75 in an overtime battle. Meanwhile, in Los Angeles, Chapman and Los Angeles State moved into the Western regional finals of the NCAA small college competition with easy wins. Chapman walloped Willamette College of Oregon, 73-52. Eliseo Nino had 26 points for Los Angeles State rolled over Sacramento State 83-57.

Merrill Hoopsters Top St. Mary's for 5B Court Laurels

Klamath Falls—Merrill high will make its first trip in history to the state basketball tournament. The Huskies turned back the pesky St. Mary's high Crusaders here Friday night 47 to 41 to capture the District 5B banner. It was the second win in as many nights, ending a two-of-three game play-off. Merrill won here Thursday 59 to 49.

Two sophomores were the major factors in the Huskies' Friday success. Denny Salvadori put in all of his nine points in the first quarter to get the Klamath county champs off to the lead. Bruce Brickner put in clutch buckets when St. Mary's came up close in the last quarter.

Merrill headed 41 to 32 after three periods but with five minutes to go the difference had shrunk to three points at 42 to 39. Then, Brickner swished two hook shots and a free toss for five of the six points the Huskies managed in the last chukker. The Klamath club led the Jackson county winners 16 to 10 at the quarter and 29 to 20 at the half. Brickner had 17 points for the evening. Al Yates put in 14 for the Medford nine. Bud Maupin, who had 23 for the Huskies on the previous night, was held to seven Friday.

Idaho Five Defeats UO

Moscow, Idaho—(UPI)—The Idaho Vandals, led by Jim Prestel, defeated Oregon 81-75 in an overtime Pacific Coast conference basketball game here Friday night. Prestel, ordinarily cast in the role of a defensive star, proved to be an offensive ace. He scored 25 points, 13 in the last half.

Stanford, Calif.—(UPI)—Stanford finished out the season undefeated on its own court, but the Indians had to come from behind twice to defeat Oregon State college, 70-54, Friday night in a Pacific Coast conference basketball game. The Beavers moved out to a seven point first half lead only to see it evaporate before the shooting of Dick Haga and Paul Neumann. Stanford left the floor at intermission with a 37-35 lead.

Again in the second half Oregon State put on the four point lead, but the Indians caught up at 49-49 with 10 minutes top lay and from that point were never threatened. It was the season finale for Stanford. Top scorer of the game was Haga with 25 with Neumann following with 21. Jim Woodland led the Beavers with 18 points. Stanford, racking up a 10-6 conference record, has now won 15 games in a row on its home court.
