

Myrtle Creek, Glide Reach District 6 A-1 Hoop Final

Ashland - Eagle Point high school took third place in the District 6A basketball playoff defeating Henley 55-45 here last night.

Eagle Point led at all quarter stop 9-4, 26-17, and 39-25. Bill Turner scored 24 points for the Eagles and Phil Swisher had 16 for the Hornets.

Ashland-Myrtle Creek and Glide High schools triumphed Friday to earn spots in the Saturday night finals of the District 6 A-2 basketball tournament at Southern Oregon college gym.

Myrtle Creek's Vikings led to 46 but Glide had to rally from a 4 to 7 deficit before running away 63 to 40 over Eagle Point.

The championship game last night determined the district's entrant in the state A-2 tournament March 16-18 at Coos Bay. Eagle Point and Henley were foes in last night's consolation game.

Lindquist 10 for the Vikings. Glide's team of shorties, with only one man up to the 6-foot height, combined speed and top flight defense to Douglas county final. MC was champ of the Umpqua Valley league and Glide was runner-up.

The Vikings, No. 1 rated in Oregon prep polls for their class, jumped off to a 15 to 10 first quarter lead and were on top 15 to 10 at halftime.

LeRoy Larson, Henley, paced all his point producers with 20 but his effort was not sufficient to deter Myrtle Creek which had a 42 to 33 third quarter margin on the way to its victory. Fred Earwood had 18 points and Gregg

overcome taller Eagle Point. Bill Turner, as usual, was the leading Eagle performer with 19 markers. He had six of the seven EP points which put his club ahead at the start. John Livingston had 18 tallies and Les Bogner 15 for Glide.

Glide fought out to a 12 to 9 first period advantage. The Wildcats tightened up to hold Eagle Point to seven points in the second stanza and rolled for 18 counters, themselves, for 30 to 16 gap at halftime. After three quarters the score was 55 to 33.

Big Ten Now Favors Rose Bowl

Madison, Wis. - (UP) - The Big Ten voted Friday in favor of opening negotiations to resume annual participation in the Rose Bowl football game.

The joint group of faculty representatives and athletic directors voted on a resolution approving further participation in the bowl by the conference and also authorizing the group's Rose Bowl Committee to open negotiations to continue sending a representative to the games.

The Rose Bowl contract with the Pacific Coast conference, under which the Big Ten sent teams for the last 13 years, was terminated last August on request of the PCC because of dissolution of that group. The last game under the old contract will be played next Jan. 1 with the athletic directors of the old PCC acting as trustees.

Any future games by the Big Ten teams in the bowl would have to be arranged under a new agreement. Because of the Big Ten action, which still must be approved by the member faculties of the group, it was expected that representatives of the Tournament of Roses committee and whatever West Coast schools now will ally themselves with the Rose Bowl, will invite the Big Ten group to continue the past bowl relationship.

Delany Sets New Mile Mark Inside

New York - (UP) - Ireland's Ron Delany clinched a spot as one of foot racing's all-time greats Saturday night with a blazing last-lap kick which nailed Hungary's Istvan Rozsavolgyi by a stride with a new world indoor mile record of 4:01.4 at Madison Square Garden.

The Olympic 1500-meter champion smashed his own two-week old world indoor mark of 4:02.5 as he rambled to his 31st consecutive indoor mile triumph and his 37th straight indoor triumph in the Columbian mile.

He almost gave it away when, with a lap and a half to go, Hungary's 2000-meter world record holder jumped on top to a 10-yard lead. But Delany moved in behind the hammering Hungarian and then nipped him at the tape as the crowd of 13,000 rocked the rafters at this Knights of Columbus meet. Rozsavolgyi himself bettered the two-week old mark as he was clocked in 4:01.8.

Two USC Swimmers Set Marks

Los Angeles - (UP) - Two University of California swimmers, including Australian Olympic Champion Murray Rose, set new NCAA records Saturday in the Pacific Coast Conference's southern division championships.

But their team lost the three-day meet to well-balanced Stanford, 161-148 1/2. Rose stroked to victory in the 440-yard free style in the record time of 4:22.6, clipping nearly six seconds off the old mark of 4:28.4 set by Ford Konno of Ohio State University in 1955.

The Australian's teammate, Charles Bittick, won the 100-yard backstroke in 56.3 seconds, eclipsing the record of 56.5 set by Hoshi Oyakawa of Ohio State also in 1955.

John Jurgensen of Stanford set a new PCC Southern Division record in the 100-yard butterfly race. He won in 55.9 seconds. The old record of 56.2 was set by Ron Volmer of California in 1957.

Stanford's victory at the UCLA women's pool was mainly a matter of team depth.

Although USC won 11 of 16 first-and Stanford got only five—the Indians scored heavily in the five runner-up positions in each event.

UCLA finished third in the meet with 37 points, and the University of California was last with 36 1/2.

OSC Skiers Rank High

Norden, Calif. - (UP) - Oregon State skiers took a first and second Saturday to give their school a slim lead over the University of Nevada in the Vanderbilt Memorial Ski meet at Sugar Bowl.

Oregon State's Aage Teien covered the cross-country course late Saturday in the time of 39:27. He was closely followed by Chico State's Roddy Stainn with 39:49, and Harry Richson of Nevada with a time of 40:19.

In the slalom, held earlier, Doug Salter of Nevada streaked through the gates with an aggregate time of 2:08.9 for two runs. Salter's first run in 63.1 was the fastest of the day.

Second in the slalom was Oregon State's Harold Amundsen whose aggregate was 2:09.5. He was closely followed by third place winner Don Newman of Stanford with 2:09.7.

New York - (UP) - Former world welterweight champion Johnny Saxton, washed up at 28 has admitted three small time robberies in order to get money to pay back income taxes, police reported.

"I wouldn't have done this if I didn't need the money," said Saxton Wednesday night after he was arrested for stealing \$55.45 worth of goods from the Queens apartment of Mrs. Adelaide Farrell.

"I made a quarter of a million dollars as a fighter, and now I owe \$16,000 in taxes," the Negro boxer said. "Three years ago I was champ and now I haven't got a job."

Police said Saxton admitted robbing two other apartments in Queens Feb. 20 of some cheap jewelry. He was booked for felonious assault and carrying a weapon pending investigation of the burglaries.

Washington - (UP) - Secretary of State John Foster Dulles left Walter Reed hospital yesterday for a half hour drive with his wife through sun-swept Rock Creek park.

State Department spokesman Joseph Reap said the cancer-stricken secretary "thoroughly enjoyed" the ride in a chauffeur-driven limousine and "felt refreshed" on his return to the hospital.

It was the first time the 71-year-old statesman had been out of the hospital since he entered it Feb. 10 for a hernia operation that disclosed a recurrence of abdominal cancer.

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
