Good Drivers Must Know More Than Just How to Steer, Department Says

Salem — Almost everyone who drives a car considers himself a good driver. In fact, a recent survey in one eastern state disclosed that 34 per cent of the drivers interviewed thought they were "better than average" drivers.

But to be a good driver, the Oregon department of motor vehicles says the motorists must know more than just how to steer and stop. He also must have a thorough knowledge of state traffic laws.

The department says it believes that many Oregon drivers, even some who drive every day, can't score 100 per cent on a test of their traffic law knowledge. Read the questions carefully; they are not as easy as they might at first appear.

Here's the test:

Headlights

1. You must dim your headlights at night whenever you are following another car within 100 feet. () True () False.

2. In Oregon, it is legal to make a left-turn from a two-way street into a one-way street against a red light, providing you first come to a complete stop, if the turn will not interfere with other traffic on the one-way street. () True () False.

3. It is unlawful to pass another only when a solid line appears on your side of the center line. () True () False.

4. You must signal a turn continuously during the last 25 feet, 35 feet, 75 feet before the turn is made. Check one.

5. A driver must turn on his headlights when there is not enough visibility for him to see clearly for a distance of 1,000 feet. () True () False.

6. Oregon has a fixed speed limit of 25 miles an hour on ocean beaches. () True () False.

7. A steady yellow light, used with changing red and green lights, means you must not enter an intersection under any circumstances. () True () False.

8. In Oregon, it's legal to make U-turns at any rural location. () True () False.

9. Before passing another car Oregon law requires that you sound your horn. () True () False.

10. When driving in fog during the day, the law requires you to turn on your parking lights. () True () False.

Now check your answers with the correct ones: 1. False, 2. True, 3. False, 4. 50 feet, 5. 55 miles per hour, 6. False, lights must be turned on when a driver cannot see clearly for 500 feet, 7. True, 8. False, you can enter the intersection if you are traveling at a lawful speed and are too close to stop safely when the yellow light appears, 9. False, even in rural areas you cannot make a reverse turn on or near any curve or hillcrest, or at any other place where you cannot see the roadway for at least 500 feet in either direction, 10. True, 11. False, you cannot use parking lights at any time visibility is limited.

If you answered all 11 questions correctly, rate your knowledge of state traffic laws "excellent"; 7-10, very good; 5-6, good; below 5, fair.

If you answered less than five correctly, the department suggests you secure a copy of the state Drivers Manual and re-study it.

Aetna Helicopter Opens Office Here

A branch office of Aetna Helicopters, Inc., Aetna, Calif., has been opened in space at the Rogue Flying Service offices at the Medford Airport, O. C. Anderson, operator of the local office, has announced.

The Medford city council Thursday night authorized a sublease for Aetna, which has been operating out of Aetna, Calif., for five years.

The company specializes in power line patrol, transportation for fire controls, transportation for any emergency, student training, and cooperation with law enforcement agencies.

One helicopter will be at the Medford airport at first, Anderson said. Anderson has been with the company for about two years.

You and Your Pet

Fundamentally all dogs want to please people, even more than they want to hunt or fight. The good trainer takes advantage of this. Dogs that love their owners want to obey them. Therefore gain your dog's confidence and love. Your displeasure will make him despair, your praise and pleasure will give him such delight that he will endeavor to repeat whatever caused it.

Trainers of the K 9 Corps learned this fact; the Seeing Eye takes continued advantage of it; and all the great field trainers emphasize how much more reliable is the dog who works for love instead of fear.

When selecting a puppy, it should look solid and well fed, be lively and alert, with a coat that is sleek, not dry or dull. His skin should be free of parasites or any sign of rash. The eyes should be bright and clear, the gums pink and firm, the breath sweet. Be sure he can see and hear well.

Type of Dog

As to type of dog, the paramount consideration is the amount of time, exercise facilities and companionship you are going to be able to give him.

A city apartment indicates the smaller-sized dog, and if he's going to be alone all day, it is kinder to have two small dogs, so they can keep each other company. With yard space available, the larger breeds are suitable. One common misconception is that certain breeds are treacherous. Completely untrue, disposition is a characteristic of the individual, not of the breed.

Grooming is another factor in making your choice, short-coated dogs require little more than daily brushing, long coats need more attention, stylized coats must have periodic stripping and trimming to keep their smart appearance.

How much should the dog be fed? The best feeding gauge is to allow three quarters of an ounce of food per pound of adult dog weight. About one pound for a 22 pound dog. This can be fed at dinner or divided into breakfast and supper. Any time the dog doesn't finish his meal promptly, pick it up and do not offer anything else until the next regular feeding time. The dog's general condition and demeanor must be your guide. But don't be fooled by those limpid eyes, for dogs are the world's champion panhandlers. Overfeeding is no kindness.

What is the best food for my dog? Any prepared food, either dried or wet-pack, produced by a reputable dog-food manufacturer, is preferable to the random rations contrived by the busy housewife out of scraps.

What is the best way to housebreak my dog? The basic rule is that prevention is better than punishment. A puppy should be taken out doors the first thing in the morning, right after a nap, after a romp, after every meal, the last thing at night, and always to the same spot.

A young puppy should not be given the run of the house at first, for he will be bound to make mistakes. Dogs generally do not soil their beds. Don't punish your dog for mistakes, his mental process cannot connect the punishment with the act. "Rubbing his nose in it" is imbecilic, the dog will merely be confused.

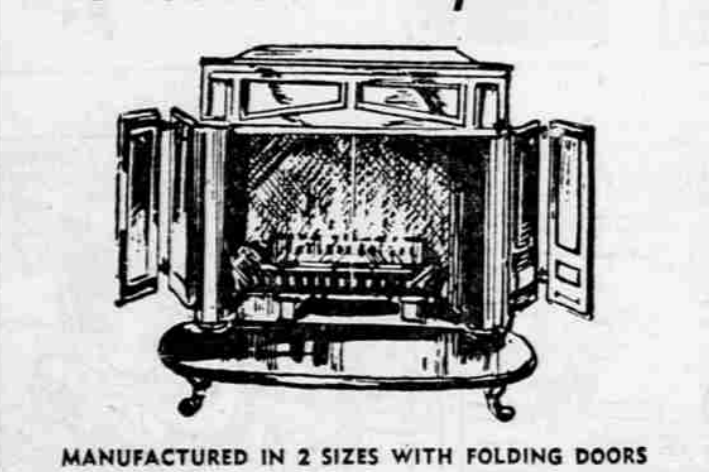

Ronald P. Clancy, 21, who escaped from the city jail by sawing through a lock, was arrested Thursday night.

Ernest James Lopus, held on a Dyer act charge, escaped Thursday after being permitted to enter a bathroom at Physicians and Surgeons hospital. Police said he used a key fashioned from a piece of wire to unlock leg irons, cut a window screen and escaped while wearing a bathrobe and slippers. He was arrested last October on a charge of driving a stolen tractor from Sacramento to Medford. He was in the hospital for treatment of a back injury.
