## Nicaragua Jelliner Crash Fatal To 15

Managua, Nicaragua — (UPI) — A British-made prop-jetliner crashed near here Thursday, moments after takeoff from Mercedes Airport, killing 15 of the 19 persons aboard. Four of the dead were American.

Two American stewardesses, Nancy Niezgod, of Mannington, W. Va., and Laura Dizenzo, a naturalized American from Hamilton, Ont., escaped serious injury but were hospitalized for treatment of extreme shock.

The four-engine Viscount, operated by Central America's Taca Airline, was outbound from Managua on a flight to Honduras and El Salvador at the time of the crash.

## Anti-Picket Repeal Signed by Hatfield

Salem — (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield has signed into law the bill which repeals Oregon's 1953 so-called anti-picketing measure.

The governor, in signing the bill Thursday, said he was "maintaining consistency with my own legislative record, with my conscience and with the unconstitutional aspect of this law as determined by the judicial branch of the government."

The labor-backed measure later passed the Democratic-controlled House and Senate. The 1953 law banned picketing for organizational purposes. One section of the law earlier was declared unconstitutional by the State Supreme court.

## Mrs. FDR Voices Free World Plan

Eugene — (UPI) — Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt said Thursday night that it is necessary to work for a free world. "It can't be accomplished through wishful thinking."

Mrs. Roosevelt spoke to about 5000 persons in McArthur Court on the University of Oregon campus.

She said that if people in this country could recapture an avid desire for learning "we would have a better chance to meet the planned economy and discipline of the country that is Russia today."

The widow of the former president said that in Russia people are educated for the state. "The United States

needs to take a good look at education to see if we are accomplishing our objectives. We can't afford to fail to meet this planned Soviet discipline," she said.

## Historic Dies Said Recovered

Portland — (UPI) — Two century-old dies for the Beaver state gold coin, stolen from the Oregon Historical society here last week, have been recovered and police said Friday that two suspects were under arrest.

However, they added that the man suspected of masterminding the burglary was still at large.

Detectives arrested Kenneth L. Schmitz, 25, Sandy, and Harvey W. Culver, 27, Portland on burglary charges.

They added that the third man being sought was formerly a resident of the Kelso-Longview, Wash. area. They said it was through the co-operation of Ralph Benefiel, Longview police chief, that the two dies, valued by the Oregon Historical society at \$20,000, were recovered.

Portland — A color film depicting the "Lewis and Clark Story" is now available for showing to Lewis and Clark college alumni, civic, church and youth groups.

The short movie was produced by George Hartness, photographer and husband of a member of the psychology faculty. He took most of the pictures over a period of three years for his own interest and then gave them to the college at cost when need of such a film became evident.

The sound movie opens with introductory remarks by President Morgan S. Odell, narrator throughout the story. It contains sequences of football, basketball, track and baseball, campus scenes, buildings, classroom views and students at work and play, concluding with a commencement ceremony.

## Museum Reports 2,733 Visitors

Jacksonville — Visitors at the Jacksonville museum during February totaled 2,733, an increase of 1,034 over the same month last year, Miss Mary Hanley, curator, has announced.

In February, 1958, there were 1,699 visitors to the museum. Last month's number brought the total since the museum opened July 10, 1950, to 317,798, Miss Hanley reported.

Visitors last month came from 29 states, Canada, Mexico, and the Philippines. Student classes touring the museum included the third, fourth, fifth and sixth grades of West Side school, Medford; Dr. Arthur Taylor's Southern Oregon college history class; a special education class from Phoenix; the Jacksonville seventh grade; eighth grade classes from Grants Pass, and the Future Farmers of America class from Central Linn school, Halsey, a total of 205 pupils.

Other groups visiting the museum included Cub Scouts, Brownie troops, Bluebirds, the Christian Youth Crusaders, and the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce greeters committee.
