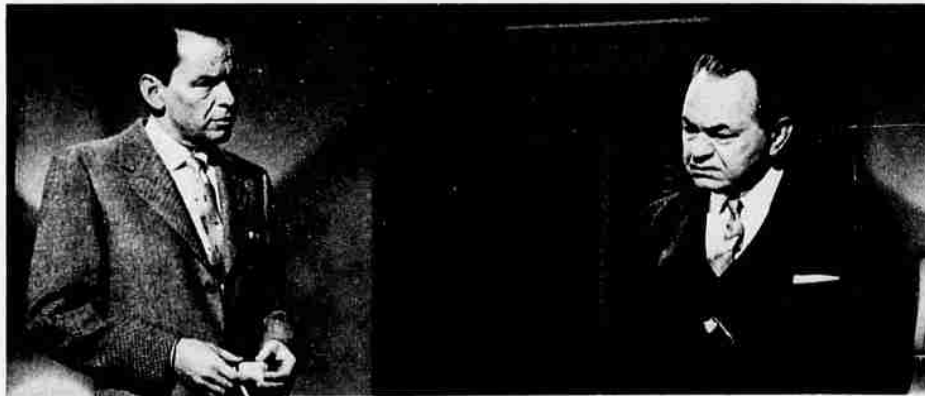

He winked. "What I ask Frankie-boy and what I write are two different things."

Frank is natural copy. No rule he makes can change that fact. And for somebody looking for a fresh angle—a screaming headline—all he has to do is prod the irascible actor like a picador in the bull ring. He'll get a punch or a cussing out and go back to his typewriter happy with a sensational story.

But looking at Frank, beset and embittered, you get the feeling that it's not worth it. For all his triumphs and his millions, he's got enough troubles of his own making without your adding to them.

So you say, "Good-bye, Mr. Sinatra; thanks for the interview," and exit gently.

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
