2 Berths in NCAA Cage Tournament Yet To Be Filled

The last two berths in the already-begun NCAA major-college basketball tournament may be filled tonight — unless those pesky St. Louis Billikens can hand Oscar Robertson and his Cincinnati teammates their second straight upset.

Robertson and Co. blew their first chance to wrap up the Missouri Valley conference title, and with it an NCAA berth, when they took an 84-66 shellacking from Bradley Saturday night.

Now Cincinnati is down to its last game of the regular season and that's at home tonight against St. Louis, which will be one of the seeded teams in the National Invitation Tournament opening in New York on Thursday. If Cincinnati loses this one, too, it will finish the conference race in a tie with Bradley and force a playoff game between the two on Wednesday at Wichita, Kans.

Win Means NCAA Berth
If Cincinnati wins tonight, the Bearcats qualify for an NCAA berth against Texas Christian Friday night in the Lawrence, Kan., regional. And Bradley, at last eliminated from the league race, would be free to accept the last remaining berth in the 12-team NIT.

The other empty NCAA berth will definitely be settled tonight, because it goes to the winner of the New Mexico State-Arizona State U. game at Las Cruces, N.M. These two teams, along with Texas Western, tied for the Border Conference title. New Mexico State eliminated Texas Western, 65-48, in a first playoff game Saturday. Tonight's winner goes on to meet Idaho State in an NCAA first-round game, probably at Pocatello, Idaho, Wednesday.

The NCAA tournament actually got under way with a single game at Portland, Ore., last Saturday night in which De Paul scored a 57-56 thriller over Portland. Portland notched two baskets in the last 35 seconds but fell short as Bill Haig led De Paul to victory with 19 points. The Blue Demons thus qualified to meet nationally top-ranked Kansas State at Lawrence Friday night.

Playoffs Clinch Berths
Saturday also saw two of the last four NCAA berths clinched, both as a result of playoff games.

Dartmouth, defending Ivy League champion, retained that crown by beating Princeton, 69-68, at New Haven, Conn., on Rudy La Russo's

Ron Delany Sets Mark

Milwaukee, Wis.—UPI—Irish miler Ron Delany and Australian two miler Al Lawrence, fresh from world-record breaking performances, feature the finest field ever tonight in the eighth running of the Milwaukee Journal Games.

Two other world record holders are in the assemblage of nearly 500, but Delany and Lawrence will get most of the attention.

Delany scored the greatest and most popular victory of his career Saturday night in the Knights of Columbus games in New York by winning his 31st straight indoor mile in world record time of 4:01.4.

8:46.8 Two Mile
Lawrence, a black haired little Australian who had trouble "figiting himself into form," ran the two mile in the world record time of 8:46.8.

The other record holders are pole vaulters Don Bragg, of Philadelphia, and Bob Gutowski, of the Quantic Marines. Bragg has the top indoor mark of 15 feet, 9 1/2 inches, and Gutowski is highest outdoors with 15 feet, 9 3/4 inches. They've met eight times this year, and Gutowski has yet to win.
