The rested, smiling First Lady gave reporters the statistic when she returned home late Monday aboard the Columbine III.

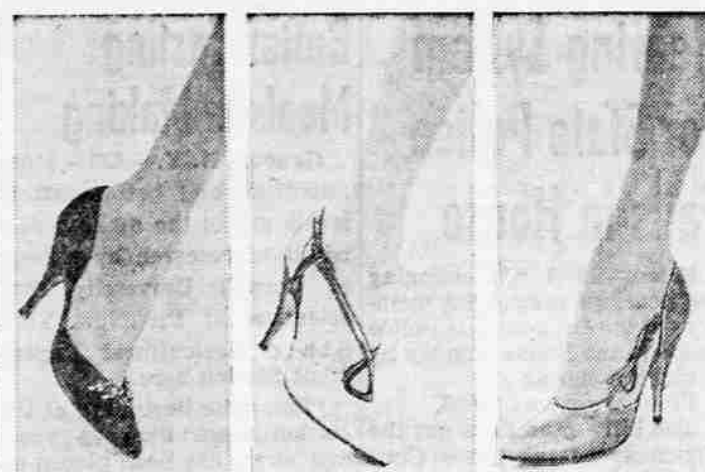
The President did not meet her at the airport, but sent her son, Maj. John Eisenhower, and two military aides.

Local Youths Fined Following Accident

Four Medford youths were fined for illegal possession of alcoholic beverages and one of them was fined for disorderly conduct in Medford municipal court Monday following an accident Saturday morning.

Another member of the quartet was fined a total of \$25 for four traffic citations.

Police identified the four as William Woodrow Wallace, 18, of 1019 Narrigan st.; Earl Bruce Stewart, 19, of 305 Effie st.; Jerry Wayne Krous, 20, of route 3, box 75; and Clyde Alvin Severson, 19, of 924 South Ivy st. All pleaded guilty to the charges.

Find \$25 Each
The first three were fined \$25 each. Severson's fines—\$25 for the illegal possession and \$50 for disorderly conduct—were suspended on condition he carry out his assurance to the court that he was going to join the U.S. Navy.

Stewart had been issued citations for having no operator's license in his possession, for inadequate brakes, for expired vehicle license plates and for switched license plate tabs.

Police gave this account of events leading up the youth's arrests:

The vehicle in which they were riding, operated by Stewart, collided at 1:05 a.m. Saturday with one operated by Jack Lee Haring, 18, of 1016 Ingrid st., at the intersection of Stewart ave. and Kings highway. Stewart was northbound on Kings highway and ran a stop sign at Stewart ave. when the car's brakes failed and struck Haring's car, which was westbound on Stewart ave.

Vehicles Wrecked

Both vehicles were wrecked, police said. After the impact, Stewart's car struck a gas station pump and light fixture in a service station at the corner leased to Earl William Read, route 4, box 377A.

Three beer bottles were found in the four youths' vehicle, and a policeman observed Severson breaking two more on the pavement.

The disorderly conduct charge against Severson was lodged for repeated use of profanity.

Wallace and Stewart were transported by ambulance to Rogue Valley hospital, where Wallace was treated for a head laceration and Stewart refused treatment. The other two were taken to Sacred Heart hospital for a scalp laceration and Severson was checked for possible side injuries.

Haring suffered a bump on the knee, but declined transportation to the hospital.

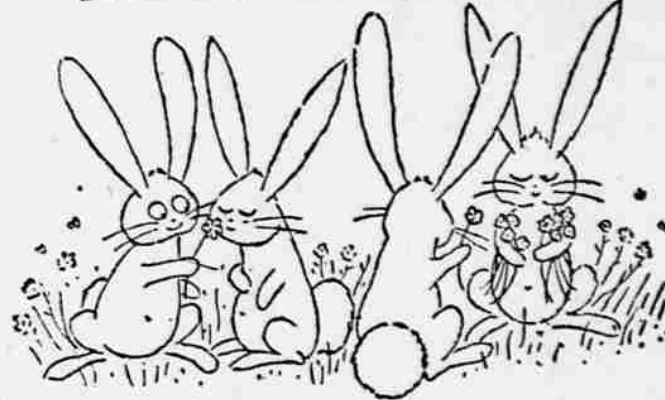

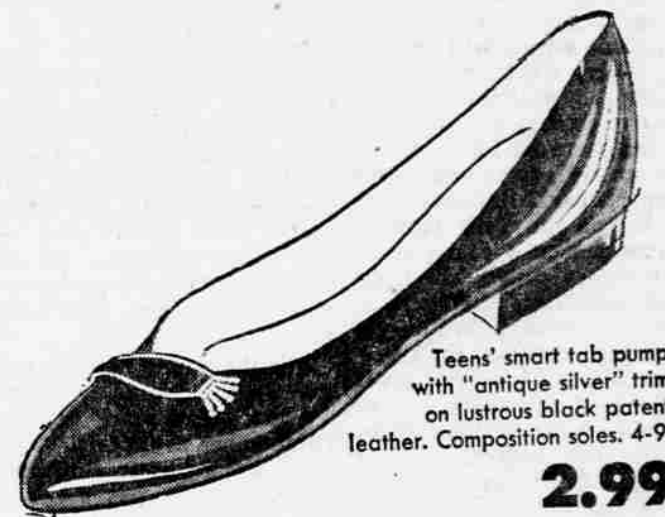

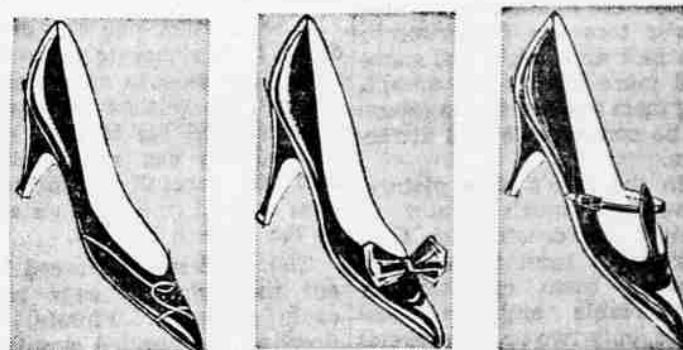


Teens' smart tab pump with "antique silver" trim on lustrous black patent leather. Composition soles. 4-9.
