Hillsboro Feed Warehouse Burns

Hillsboro—(UPI)—Damage was estimated at \$200,000 today from a fire which destroyed a three-story bulk feed storage building at North Plains Monday night.

The fire of undetermined origin, was believed to have started in the rear of the structure. The blaze was discovered about 5:30 p.m. and burned for two hours.

The building contained bulk grain and machinery. Firemen from Cedar Mill, Hillsboro, Forest Grove and Orenco joined those from North Plains in battling the flames. Water was spread on other nearby structures.

The building was one of four at North Plains housing the De Fries & Son Feed Mills.
