G.P. TRUCKER FINED

Salem—(UPI)—Dean S. Axtell, Grants Pass trucker, Tuesday was fined \$500 by the Public Utilities Commission for allegedly transporting products not allowed under his permit. Jonel C. Hill, PUC commissioner, said evidence at a Salem hearing last month indicated Axtell had illegally transported certain commodities. Axtell did not appear at the hearing.

EXHIBIT SPACE SOLD

Portland—(UPI)—The director of exhibits for the Oregon Centennial Exposition and International Trade Fair which opens in Portland June 10 said Tuesday that 80 per cent of the 682 exhibit spaces has been sold. John Hyatt, the exhibits director, said it represents an investment of \$25 million.
