Recent Research on Heart Disease

We have long heard a good deal about the American Heart Association and its program of research, and assistance to people. The address of the main office of the Association is 44 East 23rd st., N.Y. York 10, N.Y.

A while ago it was discovered in zoos that certain baboons that had died and had been autopsied showed changes in their big blood vessels—changes remarkably like those that occur in man. Accordingly, Dr. Russell L. Holman, of the Louisiana State University School of Medicine, went to South Africa and started trapping and studying wild baboons. A high percentage of the adult animals were found to have small fatty deposits in their large arteries. A small number had fairly extensive fatty deposits, and one animal, an elderly male, had a number of scars in his main artery, closely resembling those of man. The females had slightly more fatty deposits than did the males. These findings are of great interest, and physicians are looking forward to what can be learned now from laboratory studies on these "cousins of man."

Home Detective Work In Cases Of Asthma
I recently read a delightful autobiography by Dr. Alton Goldbloom (Lippincott) who is one of the great pediatricians of his generation. He gives some examples of what an observant person can do in the case of a child with attacks of asthma. He tells of a case in which he found that the spells came always on Friday night. A little investigation then showed that the child was allergic to the fish eaten that day instead of meat, and when no more fish was given, the youngster remained well. On going into the home of another child with asthma, the doctor heard a canary singing. He asked the mother, "How long have you had the canary?" and she said, "One week." He asked, "How long has the child been ill?" and the mother said, "One week." The canary was banned and the child was well. A week later, Dr. Goldbloom was called to another home on the same street to see another child with asthma. On walking in, he found the same canary; it had been given as a present to his new little patient. In another case, Dr. Goldbloom found that the child got asthma only on week-ends. The father, who was a commercial traveler, came home week-ends. He was a heavy smoker and the child was allergic to tobacco. The father stopped smoking in the house, and the child was cured.

Another type of allergy was found in the case of an infant with a skin eruption, which would not yield to any known ointment or form of treatment. For some reason, Dr. Goldbloom came to suspect the mother's nail polish. When she removed it, the baby was well. Looks at Patients

It is said that so many patients today feel that diagnoses should be made only with laboratory tests and x-ray films. They could not be more wrong. Many of the more difficult diagnoses are made by an observant physician who looks at his patients. For instance, one day I was asked to see an elderly man whose only complaint was that he was so horribly tired

he couldn't even think of going fishing. He had been given almost every test that his distinguished physicians could think of, but none of these tests had shown anything wrong. One glance at the man, and the diagnosis was made. I simply said, "On this hot July day, what are you doing with big rubber overshoes on?" He said, "Oh, doctor, I feel so cold all the time." When I got a basal metabolic rate measured, the figure was 40 per cent lower than it should have been. His thyroid gland was not functioning, and when we gave him thyroid substance, he soon felt like a new man.

I remember, many years ago, when a large construction project was nearly stopped by an epidemic of typhoid fever, one of my friends, an expert on public health, was sent to the scene to investigate. He soon found the head cook of the camp was a carrier of typhoid fever. He had him fired, and that was the end of the epidemic. Some weeks later, on returning home, he got a telegram from a nearby lumber camp saying, "A typhoid epidemic has just started here—come and help us." My friend telegraphed, "What's the name of your cook?" As he expected, it was the man from the construction camp. He was fired, and that was the end of the new epidemic.

Cornel Deformity
Occasionally a person is born with a deformed cornea—the transparent front window of the eye. Sometimes, instead of being rounded, it is somewhat conical in shape. If I had it, I'd go to a good ophthalmologist and take his advice. I imagine he would try to get me fitted with a contact lens, which might help me a great deal.
