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Creation of State Development Credit Corporation Proposed in Senate Bill

Salem—Creation of a state development credit corporation is the purpose of a bill introduced by Sen. Robert Straub (D-Springfield).

Straub said the proposed corporation would work closely with the State Planning and Development Commission in bringing new industries into the state. He said it would bring more of the benefits of long-term capital money provided under the Small Business Administration acts of 1958.

Others Have Them

"This bill," he said "would foster a united effort among Oregon's financial institutions to promote the development of industrial growth here. Control of the corporation would be in the hands of such institutions as banks and savings and loan associations who would supply the local money required to match federal funds."

Straub said most of the New England states and those in the South have had such corporations for several years and similar legislation was being considered in Washington, Idaho and Montana.

The state corporation would not compete with private

lending institutions, Straub said. If a borrower can qualify for a loan from regular channels he would not be able to borrow from the state institution.

Director On Board
The corporation set-up in the bill provides that two-thirds of the board of directors would be selected by the financial institutions who have become members and that one-third would be elected by subscribers to the stock in the corporation. The minimum capital stock would be \$25,000.

The director of the State Planning and Development Commission would serve on the corporation board as an ex-officio member. Straub's bill would authorize financial institutions to lend three per cent of their capital and surplus to the corporation.

Congress is asked to increase the present recommended appropriation for construction of access roads into timbered areas in national forests in Senate Joint Memorial No. 3, adopted by the Senate.

Straub said that Congress had authorized \$30 million for

the building of access roads but the budget division had reduced this sum to \$24 millions for the next year.

Not Much Weight
Straub and Sen. Melvin Goode (R-Albany) agreed that memorials as a rule do not carry much weight in Washington, D. C., but both senators felt adoption of the memorial would assist members of the Oregon delegation in urging that the original sum authorized be appropriated.

Amendments to the meat inspection law, passed two years ago, were approved by the Senate. Principal changes in the law provide for inspection of non-slaughtering processing plants and moving vehicles selling custom meats. If the amendments are adopted by the governor, the Agriculture Department will be able to add inspection of establishments making sausage, ground round, hamburger and frankfurters.

Also added to the list of plants to be inspected are those which process dog and cat food.

Bond Allowance Upped
A Senate bill which eliminated the right of an opponent of a candidate to issue a state-

ment in the voters' pamphlet against such a candidate was passed.

Sen. Goode said that he felt perhaps this "took politics out of politics."

The Senate passed without opposition a bill increasing the bonding limits of the Board of Higher Education on construction of self liquidating buildings. The limit is now set at \$15,350,000 but under the house bill approved this limit is increased to \$24 million for the next two years.

When members of the Senate Committee on Labor and Industries found no provision in a proposed new state electrical code for inspection and regulation of the sale of electrical equipment by public auctioneers, they decided to do something about it.

Sen. Carl Francis told the committee there was a bill in the Senate Judiciary Committee that would impose some regulations on auctioneers, but he felt that it would be better to have the control of sale of electrical goods in the code.

To Seek Representative
Sen. Dan Dimick, chairman of the Committee, said he would ask the auctioneers as-

sociation to designate a representative to appear before the committee to discuss the proposed regulations.

When the State Supreme Court held the old state electrical code unconstitutional in some respects, members of the Labor and Industries Committee decided to draw up a new code.

Conferences have been held with representatives of the electrical industry, and also with representatives of various companies that would be affected by the code. Dimick said virtually all differences of opinion have been ironed out.

A bill introduced by Sen. G. D. Gleason (D-Portland) at the request of the Multnomah county commissioners abolishing the offices of constable and clerk of the district court in Multnomah county was introduced.

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
